

A Letter From Father Tom

Dear Friends,

Welcome to the season of Advent, a season of hope – one designed for Apostles of Hope. With the first Advent candle we light this weekend, we begin a new liturgical year. As we do, we are reminded that God constantly offers us new beginnings, and faithfully accompanies us as our journeys continue. The starkness of our Advent decor reminds us to "de-clutter", to quiet down, and to wait in hope for Emmanuel, God-with-us.

We move from Mark's gospel to Luke's. Unlike the rapid-paced action of Mark, Luke has written a longer narrative that suggests readers need to slow down and take some time to reflect on what he has recorded. In this gospel one of the key themes is prayer. The whole gospel is set in a prayerful environment. Slowing down to reflect on this gospel could be our "New Year's resolution" as we begin this new liturgical year. Such a thoughtful reading can accomplish one of the purposes Luke seems to have in mind for his readers: to evoke and deepen in us a spirit of prayer and growth in discipleship as we journey with Jesus on the road to Jerusalem. During these busy days before Christmas perhaps lighting a candle before retiring and praying to feel the shaping, consoling, nurturing hands of God may bring a deeper sense of hope and calm to our Advent and Christmas preparations.

Thanks to the Finance Committee for their presentation to us last weekend and again thank you to all of you who so wonderfully make our parish happen. I would be totally remiss if I do not publicly thank our Parish Business Manager, Virginia Portanova, for being the anchor who keeps our parish not simply solvent but warm, loving, and alive with hope. Please join me in thanking her as once again our Apostle of Hope whose selfless service to us, the Body of Christ, keeps us afloat and faithful to the Lord who blesses us to be Sts. Philip and James Parish Community.

And to you – the faith- filled people of Sts. Philip and James! It is an honor and privilege to live and pray with you and to be blessed by you! Happily, as you heard last weekend our parish school, religious education program, outreach to those in need, and our many ministries desiring to be faithful to the gospel are all on course. We pause this weekend and once again give great thanks to God!

During this coming month many of our young parishioners in religious education and SSPJ school will be celebrating the sacrament of reconciliation. Advent is a wonderful time for all of us to take advantage of the healing sacrament. We will have a parish celebration of the sacrament on Monday evening, December 13th, at 7pm in church. In the next few weeks sample preparations for the sacrament will be provided in the bulletin.

A Reflection from Sister T~

Dear Friends,

We are now entering advent, what a blessed time for us. However, many folks consider this one of the busiest seasons instead of the most reflective. I want to share with you a poem by Jan Richardson. Here you go:

Blessing in the Chaos To all that is chaotic in you, let there come silence. Let there be a calming of the clamoring, a stilling of the voices that have laid their claim on you, that have made their home in you, That go with you even to the holy places but will not let you rest, will not let you hear your life with wholeness or feel the grace that fashioned you. Let what distracts you cease. Let what divides you cease. Let there come an end to what diminishes and demeans, and let depart all that keeps you in its cage. Let there be an opening into the quiet that lies beneath the chaos, where you find the peace

you did not think possible and see what shimmers within the storm. —Ja

I share this poem with you because part of my reflection for Advent this year is to answer this question: "How do I resist transformation within myself?"

It was a challenge to answer the question, and there doesn't seem to be enough time to figure it out. Happily, by chance, I had the opportunity to sit with one of our 'wisdom' sisters. We both came to the conclusion that we can become too comfortable in our life and that change is not looked upon kindly.

In re-reading the excerpt from Jan Richardson's poem (above). A light bulb went on for me. I was inspired with this thought:

We become comfortable (resisting transformation) because we don't allow the chaos to enter in. We don't sit with it in silence. For growth and transformation to occur, chaos and silence need to be a part of our lives. I don't mean the chaos that happens at this time of year like Christmas decorating or shopping. Instead, I mean the things and situations that enter in to our lives that we don't like -- something that causes us to stretch our minds and hearts.

Hopefully during this Advent season some of this reflection might be relevant to what is happening in your life. Go with the chaos and silence and I bet you will be surprised and renewed as well as joyful for the growth!





Through prayer, God helps us stay focused on that which is most important in our lives.


Dear Jesus,





THE TRADITION OF ADVENT CANDLES

The word ADVENT comes from the Latin word ADVENTUS meaning arrival. It is the four week period leading up to Christmas. The four candles remind us that we are preparing for the coming of the CHRIST CHILD, who is the light of the world. Each candle reminds us of the virtues Jesus desires for the entire world.

HOPE The first candle symbolizes the hope that Christ's birth brings us. We pray for an outpouring of hope in our homes, families, and hearts. Lord, help us prepare our hearts by being open to the light of Christ in others.

Love The second candle symbolizes the love that comes from intimacy with Jesus. Lord Jesus, help us prepare our hearts for your coming by loving others as you love us. Let us be astounded by your closeness to us and allow love to expand within our homes.

Joy The third candle symbolizes the joy that comes with Christ in our lives. Lord, we thank you for the joy you bring us. Allow our lives to truly be joyful and simple. Help us to be receptive to the freedom you desire for us.

PEACE The fourth candle symbolizes the peace of a heart close to Christ. Loving God, we thank you for the gift of peace you give us. Help us prepare our homes for the birth of baby Jesus, by allowing Christ's peace to fill our hearts.

While we're shopping for gifts, decorating, and sending Christmas cards, what are we doing to make Christmas a new rebirth of Christ for our daily lives?

All the readings at Mass during Advent remind us that this season is a time intended for spiritual preparation. It's tempting to let the busyness of December distract us from the most important purpose of Advent: our personal spiritual growth.

In our responsorial Psalm today, we proclaim: "The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy!" Do you actually feel joyful when you mouth these words?

It takes faith to experience joy in the midst of hardships. Faith grows from knowing that the Lord does great things for us because of his mercy — not because we have earned it, as we'll never be good enough. Repenting from our sins opens us to become aware of this mercy.

Therefore, Saint John the Baptizer is proclaiming to us today: "Prepare the way of

Now is the time to ask: What preparations do I need to make? What am I doing to straighten out the messes in my life, the areas of sin that continually distract me from a close relationship with Christ?

What penances will help "make straight" my path?

What depressing or discouraging valley of hardship needs to get filled with the joy of the Lord? If it seems hopeless, what will I do to let Jesus take charge of it? What mountain of debt or difficult obstacle needs to be made low by having faith in the Lord's digging tools?

What's twisted and warped in my thinking, like a road that winds through a jungle of confusion? I pray, Holy Spirit, that you will lead me straight to holiness! What's rough about me? What's edgy and sharp and rubs others the wrong way? Lord Jesus, smooth me like a diamond polisher.

Throughout, let us examine the ways in which we still need to see the salvation of God. Let us make a plan of action to be holier and happier at the end of the Jubilee Year than we are today!

OUR WOUNDS, OUR GIFTS, AND OUR POWER TO HEAL OTHERS (ARCHIVE NOVEMBER 2020)

Nearly fifty years ago Henri Nouwen wrote a book entitled, *The Wounded Healer*. Its reception established his reputation as unique spiritual mentor and he went on to become one of the most influential spiritual writers of the past half-century. What made his writings so powerful? His brilliance? His gift for expression? He was gifted, yes, but so are many others. What set him apart was that he was a deeply wounded man and from that disquieted place inside him issued forth words that were a healing balm to millions.

How does this work? How do our wounds help heal others? They don't. It's not our wounds that help heal others. Rather our wounds can color our gifts and talents in such a way so that they no longer educe resistance and envy in others but instead become what God meant them to be, gifts to grace others.

Sadly, the opposite is often true. Our gifts and talents often become the reason we're disliked and perhaps even hated. There's a curious dynamic here. We don't automatically, nor easily, let the gifts of others grace us. More often, we're reluctant to admit their beauty and power and we resist and envy those who possess them and sometimes even hate them for their gifts. That's one of the reasons we find it hard to simply admire someone.

But this reluctance in us doesn't just say something about us. Often it says something too about the persons who possess those gifts. Talent is an ambiguous thing, it can be used to assert ourselves, to separate ourselves from others, to stand out and to stand above, rather than as a gift to help others. Our talents can be used simply to point to how bright, talented, good-looking, and successful we are. Then they simply become a strength meant to dwarf others and set ourselves apart.

How can we make our talents a gift for others? How can we be loved for our talents rather than hated for them? Here's the difference: we will be loved and admired for our gifts when our gifts are colored by our wounds so that others do not see them as a threat or as something that sets us apart but rather as something that gifts them in their own shortcomings. When shared in a certain way, our gifts can become gifts for everyone else.

Here's how that algebra works: Our gifts are given us not for ourselves but for others. But, to be that, they need to be colored by compassion. We come to compassion by letting our wounds befriend our gifts. Here are two examples.

When Princess Diana died in 1997 there was a massive outpouring of love for her. Both by temperament and as a Catholic priest, I'm normally not given to grieving over celebrities, yet I felt a deep sorrow and love for this woman. Why? Because she was beautiful and famous? Not that. Many women who are beautiful and famous and are hated for it. Princess Diana was loved by so many because she was a wounded person, someone whose wounds colored her beauty and fame in a way that induced love, not envy.

Henri Nouwen, who popularized the phrase, "the wounded healer" shared a similar trait. He was a brilliant man, the author of more than forty books, one of the most popular religious speakers of his generation, tenured at both Harvard and Yale, a person with friends all over the world; but also a deeply wounded man who, by his own repeated admission, suffered restlessness, anxiety, jealousies, and obsessions that occasionally landed him in a clinic. As well, by his own repeated admission, amidst this success and popularity, for most of his adult life he struggled to simply accept love. His wounds forever got in the way. And this, his wounded self, colors basically every page of every book he wrote. His brilliance was forever colored by his wounds and that's why it was never self-assertive but always compassionate. No one envied Nouwen's brilliance; he was too wounded to be envied. Instead, his brilliance always touched us in a healing way. He was a wounded healer.

Those words, wounded and healer, ordain each other. I'm convinced that God calls each of us to a vocation and to a special work here on earth more on the basis of our wounds than on the basis of our gifts. Our gifts are real and important; but they only grace others when they are shaped into a special kind of compassion by the uniqueness of our own wounds. Our unique, special wounds can help make each of us a unique, special healer.

Our world is full of brilliant, talented, highly-successful, and beautiful people. Those gifts are real, come from God, and should never be denigrated in God's name. However, our gifts don't automatically help others; but they can if they are colored by our wounds so that they flow out as compassion and not as pride.
