

# Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Next weekend we begin our parish celebrations of First Communion, a joyful time as our children share with us at the Table of the Lord. We welcome them, and affirm them and their families and our Communion Coordinator, Charlotte Czujko and all the catechists who have prepared them to receive the Body and Blood of Christ. Their joy and excitement touch our hearts. Does joy and excitement touch our hearts as we receive Eucharist? One parent told me that after Mass one day his child asked him why the people in church just sit there and look so sad. These young ones call us to a new communion, a new awakening of the gift we have been given. They challenge us to let our inner selves be set free by the Risen One who gives himself to us.

From shepherd to gardener – in today's gospel Jesus says, "I am the vine; you are the branches." He reminds us that healthy plants need pruning, and that this pruning process brings forth more abundant and stronger blooms. He also says, "Remain in me". That phrase is both very comforting and very challenging, for as Fr. Larry Gillick, SJ, says, *Jesus asks his disciples to "remain" which is different from "stay stuck". Jesus is preparing them for their going out as he himself moves on.* Jesus prepares us to go out as Apostles of Hope, to be active, engaged participants in worship, in service and in community. While the pathway may differ for each of us, we are all called and we are all chosen to be vital branches, witnessing to the hope of our vine, Jesus.

I am delighted to welcome all of you next weekend, May 5th & 6th, the Saturday/Sunday closest to the feast of our patrons, Sts. Philip and James, to come and celebrate our "new/old church": the Bethany Center. Thank you to all who made this dream finally become a reality. Why the name "Bethany Center"? Bethany was the place of hospitality where Jesus spent such precious time with friends.

We look forward to this becoming a new center for us to deepen our lives of faith and friendship.

Many thanks to all who so generously and faithfully responded to our children's weekly reflections. We will shortly convene the catechists to review and revise this process, refining how we will present them next year. If any of you would like to share your reflections on the experience of responding to the young ones, please forward your comments to me. Thank you for your ministry of outreach and evangelization.

I hope to see you for some "fine dining" at this year's Dine Around, Monday April 30<sup>th</sup>!

# **Music Ministry**

A little bit of music history.

We here at SSPJ use four Mass Settings. Mass Settings are parts of the Mass written by the same composer. All these settings are in our Music Issue and should be very familiar to us. If you have noticed I change Mass parts with each church season; Advent, Lent, Christmas Easter and Ordinary time. Some of these settings are more festive than others so I pick according to the season.

Now, during the East<mark>er seas</mark>on we are singing th<mark>e M</mark>ass of Christ the Savior by Dan Schutte. We will be singing this through Easter until we are back in ordinary time. Then we will change again.

The parts of the Mass are called the Ordinary parts. This means words stay the same but the music changes. The Gathering, Presentation, Communion and Sending Forth are the Proper parts of the Mass. Here the music and words are different.

Along with the Mass of Christ the Savior we also use the Mass of Creation, Mass of Renewal and Mass of Resurrection.

In the future we may learn other Mass Settings. It's hard to learn new music because it's unfamiliar but the more it is used the familiar the music becomes and only adds to our worship experience.

"I knew something was wrong as soon as I saw him..."

For Long Island's homebound seniors, Meals-on-Wheels is a lifesaver. Every weekday, the program delivers hot, nutritious meals to seniors in Nassau and Suffolk counties. Meals-on-Wheels case managers also assist these seniors in accessing other services they might need.

"I knew something was wrong as soon as I saw him," explains Steve, a driver for Catholic Charities' Meals-on-Wheels. Steve had been delivering meals to Ed for several years and upon arriving that fateful day, immediately observed that he seemed disoriented.

Steve knew Ed was diabetic, so he checked his blood sugar and saw that it was low. He poured him some orange juice but sensed there was something more serious going on. "I kept asking him to let me call 911 but he resisted. I couldn't accept that so I just casually stuck around, making my case. He finally admitted that he didn't have anyone to care for his dog if he was hospitalized, so I promised I would, and that's when he gave me the green light to call."

It was a good thing, too. At the hospital Ed was diagnosed with a serious blood infection that kept him there for nearly four months. In the meantime, Steve cared for the dog until Ed's sister arrived from out of town.







#### Reflections on Next Sunday's Scripture Readings

Acts 10:25-26,34-35,44-48 1 John 4:7-10 Psalm 98 John 15:9-17

God's ways are mysterious. Each of us, at one time or another, has wished for an opportunity to address a question to the Lord -- face to face. We would prefer to go right to the top and eliminate all those in the middle. Today's readings tell us that God's mind and attitude are reflected in believers. Believers are God's spokespersons.

In the Cornelius episode, Luke declares that the Christian community is for everyone and that the Gentiles need not first become Jews to enter this community. Cornelius is the first Gentile convert to the faith. Luke has Peter show that God is impartial: "but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him" (Acts 10:35).

The author of First John is concerned with the bond that unites God with the believer. This bond is love. God is love, hence love must characterize God's family. "Everyone who loves ... knows God" (1 John 4:7). The sending of the Son is the ultimate manifestation of God's love. The fact that our sins are redeemed in Jesus means that our lifestyle is part of God's plan for salvation.

The gospel passage develops the imagery of the vine and the branches. Like the second reading, the gospel speaks of the love that unites God and the believer. Jesus' fundamental command is mutual love. Jesus' love of the disciples flows from God's love of Jesus. Far from being a personal acquisition, the love of God looks to others. "I appointed you to go and bear fruit" (John 15:16).

Christianity demands that the believer not only grasp intellectually the main tenets of the faith but also act on them in daily life. Within the context of community the believer is linked to Jesus who is linked to the Father. If God is love and Jesus' self-giving is the supreme expression of that love, then we must communicate the depth of that love by the way we live in the world. We are spokespersons for God.

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#### For reflection...

Recall a time in your life when you really felt the love of God. What was that like? How did you respond?

Has there been someone (or more than one) in your life who has loved you in a way which reveals God's love to you? How did this person (these people) reveal God to you?

Jesus asks us to love one another. Who are among the people you find easy to love? Why? Who are among the people you find challenging to love? Why? What helps you to fulfill Jesus' command?

Is love "warm and fuzzy"? "tough and hard"?
Both? How would you describe the love
God calls us to?

What does Peter's baptizing Cornelius reveal about God? How might this relate to situations in today's world?

## Spiritual Reflection by Ron Rolheiser, OMI

#### THE SHORTCOMINGS OF A DIGITAL IMMIGRANT

Information technology and social media aren't my mother tongue. I'm a digital immigrant. I wasn't born into the world of information technology but migrated into it, piece-meal. I first lived in some foreign territories.

I was nine years old before I lived with electricity. I had seen it before; but neither our home, our school, nor our neighbors had electricity. Electricity, when I first saw it, was a huge revelation. And while I grew up with radio, I was fourteen before our family got its first television set. Again, this was a revelation – and manna for my adolescent hunger for connection to the larger world. Electricity and television quickly became a mother tongue, one lit our home and other brought the big world into it. But the phone was still foreign. I was seventeen when I left home and our family had never had a phone.

The phone wasn't much to master, but it would be a goodly number of years before I mastered much in the brave new world of information technology: Computers, the internet, websites, mobile phones, smart phones, television and movie access through the internet, cloud storage, social media, virtual assistants, and the world of myriad apps. It's been a journey! I was thirty-eight when I first used a VCR, forty-two before I first owned a computer, fifty before I first accessed the web and used email, fifty-eight when I owned my first mobile phone, the same age when I first set up a website, sixty-two before I first texted, and sixty-five before I joined Facebook. With email, texting, and Facebook being all I can handle, I still do not have either an Instagram or Twitter account. I'm the only person in my immediate religious community who still prays the office of the church out of a book rather than off a mobile device.

I protest that paper has soul while digital devices do not. The responses I get are not particularly sympathetic. But it's for reasons of soul that I much prefer to have a book in my hand than a kindle device. I'm not against information technology; mainly it's just that I'm not very good at it. I struggle with the language. It's hard to master a new language as an adult and I envy the young who can speak this language well.

What's to be said about the revolution in information technology? Is it good or bad?

Obviously, it has many positives: It's making us the most informed people ever in the history of this world. Information is power and the internet and social media have leveled the playing field in terms of access to information and this is serving well the developing nations in the world. Moreover it's creating one global village out of the whole world. We now know all of our neighbors, not just those who live nearby. We're the best-informed and best-connected people ever.

But all of this also has a pejorative underbelly: We talk to each other less than we text each other. We have many virtual friends but not always many real friends. We watch nature on a screen more than we ever physically touch it. We spend more time looking at device in our hands than actually engaging others face to face. I walk through an airport or basically any other public space and I see the majority of people staring at their phones. Is this a good thing? Does it foster for friendship and community or is it their substitute? It's too early to tell. The initial generations who lived through the industrial revolution did not have any way of knowing what the effects of this would be long-range. The technological revolution, I believe, is just as radical as the industrial revolution and we are its initial generation. At this time we have no way of knowing where this will ultimately take us, for good or bad.

But one negative that seems already evident is that the revolution within information technology we are living through is destroying the few remaining remnants we still retain in terms of keeping "Sabbath" in our lives. The 13<sup>th</sup> century mystic, Rumi, once lamented: "I have lived too long where I can be reached." That's infinitely truer of us today than it was for those living in the 13<sup>th</sup> century. Thanks to the electronic devices we carry around with us we can be reached all the time – and, too often, let ourselves be reached all time. The result is that now we no longer have any time apart from what we regularly do. Our family times, our recreational times, our vacation periods, and even our prayer times are constantly rendered regular time by our "being reached". My fear is that while we are going to be the most informed people ever we may well end up the least contemplative people ever.

But I'm an outsider on this, a digital immigrant. I need to bow to the judgments of those who speak this language as their mother tongue.
