Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

You are the salt of the earth... You are the light of the world. Jesus speaks these words to us, his disciples. How do we season our world? How do we share the light of Christ? According to the prophet Isaiah in today's first reading we are called to:

Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the homeless; clothe the naked when you see them, and do not turn your back on your own. Then your light shall break forth like the dawn...

Thank you for the many ways you share with family, parish and community. Your "seasoning" enables SSPJ to thrive and to grow.

We are approaching a season of growth, the season of Lent. Lent is a time of preparation for entering ever more deeply into the Paschal Mystery- the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Lent prepares us for Easter when as a community we each renew our Baptismal Promises. There will be many opportunities for growth this coming Lent, with a special emphasis on deepening our understanding of and commitment to our Baptism. More info will be in the coming bulletins, but today I want to share with you some of our upcoming Baptismal journey!

Soon you will notice a few pews being removed from beneath one of our stained-glass windows. Which

window? The window portraying the Baptism of the Lord. (Not to worry - three of these pews will be relocated to the empty area in front of the Blessed Mother's altar and two will be renovated to be used in the sanctuary.) In the vacated space will go a new Baptismal Font, designed especially for our parish. Much more on the new font in upcoming bulletins.

Through the donation of a parishioner, we are able to begin to make some renovations which will both highlight the centrality of the sacrament of Baptism while also honoring the discipleship of all who have been baptized at SSPJ over many, many years. To do this we will be moving our present Baptismal font with its rich history to the center of our gathering area. Some may remember this font came from the "old church", now the Bethany Center. In its new location all who enter by the main doors will be able to bless themselves with holy water held in the font where so many SSPJ ancestors were baptized.



As this renovation process continues, I'll be providing explanations of each step - including ways of allowing these changes to deepen our relationship with Jesus. This renewing can be a helpful reminder to each of us during this Lent/Easter season as we renew our commitment to be disciples of Jesus, Apostles of Hope, salt of the earth, the light of the world. Stayed tuned!

As I mentioned last week, we are currently putting together some exciting plans for Lent, including opportunities for young families. We'll be having a Mardi Gras Lenten kick off, a parish mission tailored specifically to our parish, and much more. We have terrific ideas, affirmed, supported, and endorsed by the Pastoral Council. BUT, without your help it just won't be able to happen. Our Lenten theme is "take off your shoes". I respectfully ask that as these Lenten opportunities are presented you might "take off your shoes" and make our parish and our family's ever more holy ground. (More about take off your shoes next week.)

MONDAY, JANUARY 30, 2023

"Who are the "poor in spirit"? They are the ones who know they cannot rely on themselves, that they are not self-sufficient, and they live as "beggars before God". They feel their need for God and recognize every good that comes from him as a gift, as a grace. Those who are poor in spirit treasure what they receive. Therefore, they desire that *no gift should go to waste*. Today, I would like to pause on this typical aspect of the poor in spirit: *not to waste*. The poor in spirit try not to waste anything. Jesus shows us the importance of not wasting. For example, after the multiplication of the loaves and the fish, he asks that the leftover food be gathered so that nothing would be wasted (cf. *Jn* 6:12). Not wasting allows us to appreciate the value of ourselves, of people and of things. Unfortunately, however, there is a principle that is often disregarded, above all in more affluent societies where the culture of waste, the throw-away culture is predominant. Both are a plague."

A Reflection from Sister T~

Dear Friends,

Have you ever had something that had so much salt in it that you couldn't eat it? Or something that had no salt in it at all, and it just tasted bland? There has to be a middle ground. The reality is that all things done in moderation seem to work best.

What about light? Ever been driving and have it become so pitch dark that even with your headlights on, you can't see very well? Or perhaps someone comes barreling down from the opposite direction, blinding you with their bright lights on?

I have experienced all of the above and although I hear Jesus say 'we are to be salt of the earth and light of the world', the above situations still came to mind.

What does it mean in my life to be salt of the earth and light of the world? Salt is good and so is light, but when do they become an issue or problem? All I could come up with is: "when there is too much salt and too much light, then you have a problem!"

I have to go back to all things in moderation. Salt is meant to enhance the flavor of food, not dominate it. Do I dominate others in trying to teach them about the Good News? Is my way the only way? Or when I want to show people the way by shining a light on it, is it a blinding light? How will they be able to see?

I guess as much as I hate to admit it, the best way is to live a hidden life that shows the way: to enhance others' lives by my actions, no force or coercion. I need to lead by example and not words. This way the light will shine brightly enough to lead folks to the way!

Too much of a good thing can alter the situation, issue, problem, or cause. So how do I live my life like salt that hasn't lost its flavor or light that hasn't been dimmed?

By humbly being the best person that God has created me to be and gently, humbly, without fuss enhancing the journey and showing the way. Folks are more apt to follow a humble example than a loud voice.

Check in on your own salt and light; use it wisely, and in moderation!





Hebrews 11:1-7 Ps 145:2-5,10-11 Mark 9:2-13 The Jewish religious authorities of Jesus' day were often literalists in their interpretation of the Law of God. Jesus, however, gave a deeper meaning to the Law. He placed his focus on the goal of the Law: Love.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus explains that we fail to fulfill the Law when our so-called obedience isn't motivated by love.

Jesus completely fulfilled the true meaning of the Law. In doing so, he took upon himself our disobedience and died for us in the most generous gift of love.

As his followers, we also are to be generous with love. Obeying all the commandments – truly obeying them – requires loving God with our whole heart, all the time, and loving others as ourselves.


Jesus explains how to transform literal interpretations of God's laws into the Law of Love. In each example, he shows that we are to choose the most loving approach to every problem, no matter how difficult.

His first topic is anger: Sinful anger is judgmental and we are judged by this sin. Jesus provides the remedy: Go and do whatever is necessary to be reconciled. This, he points out, is even

more important than worshiping God. How genuine can our worship be if anger has replaced love in our hearts, since God is love?

Another example is lust, which is a counterfeit of love because it treats others as objects. And divorce from a valid marriage is a failure to love as Christ loves, who taught that love makes sacrifices and endures hardships. Remarriage, he says, furthers the sin because it's unloving to the spouse of the original union.

Jesus extends this teaching to every area of life. Breaking an oath is unloving. Lying and never intending to keep the commitment is unloving. In fact, the entire Sermon on the Mount,



of which this Gospel reading is a part, explains how to love.

Reflect & Discuss:

- Were you ever treated unlovingly because of another person's legalism? How did that experience hide the true nature of Jesus?
- † What habits do you have that are unloving toward yourself? How do they affect others?
- † Recall a time when someone treated you unfairly but you responded with an act of love. How difficult was it to give that love? What were the results?
- Name common ways that Christians fail to obey God. What did Jesus do to make up for those failures? For example, how do you suppose Jesus treats unborn babies who've been aborted or miscarried?

TO FALL IN LOVE

To fall in love! We use the expression to cover many things. You can fall in love with a baby, a sports team, a city, a job, or another person. However, we reserve the prime analogate for this expression for one thing, emotional infatuation, that intoxicating feeling we first get when we meet someone who we sense as a soulmate.

Iris Murdoch once wrote that the world can change in fifteen seconds because that's how quickly you can fall in love with someone. She's right, and falling in love emotionally can literally paralyze us with a grip so strong that even death seems preferable to losing the one with whom we have fallen in love. Countless heartaches, broken hearts, depressions, clinical breakdowns, suicides, murders, and murder-suicides testify to this. Emotional infatuation can be a deadly addiction, the most powerful cocaine on the planet. Where does it come from? Heaven or hell? And, what's its meaning?

Ultimately, God and nature are its author and that tells us that it is a good thing. We are built for this to happen to us. Moreover, it is a healthy thing, if properly understood, both in its intoxicating power and in its innate failure to be a sustaining power in love.

What happens when we fall in love so powerfully with someone? Are we really in love with that person or are we more in love with being in love and the feelings this brings us? As well, are we really in love with that person or are we in love with an image of him or her we have created for ourselves, one that projects a certain godliness on to that other?

Let me risk some answers. Imagine a man falling deeply in love with a woman. Initially, the feelings can be overpowering and literally paralyze him emotionally. However, inside of all this, a certain question begs to be asked: with whom or with what is he really in love? His feelings? The archetype of femininity the woman is carrying? His image of her? She herself?

In reality, he is in love with all of these: his feelings, his image of her, she herself, and the divine feminine she is carrying. All of that is of one piece inside of his experience. As well, all of this can be healthy at this stage of love.

God invented emotional infatuation, just as God invented honeymoons. We are not meant to be drawn to each other by cold analytics alone. But, this kind of falling in love is an initiatory stage in love (albeit a delightful one) that needs to be understood exactly for what it is, an initiatory stage, nothing more, one that invites us into something deeper. Emotional infatuation is not yet a mature stage in love. Unless one dies in its grip, as did Romeo and Juliet, it will one day lose its hold on us and leave us disillusioned. When Iris Murdoch said that we can fall in love in fifteen seconds, she might also have added that, sadly, we can also fall out of love in fifteen seconds. Emotional infatuation can be that ephemeral, both in its birth and in its dying.

So falling in love (in this emotional way) comes fraught with certain dangers. First, there is the adolescent proclivity to identify this with deep love itself. Consequently, when the powerful emotional and psychosexual feelings let go, the person easily concludes that he or she is no longer in love and moves on. Next, more subtly, there is this danger. When we are in this initial gripping stage of love, our image of the other carries with it a certain godliness. What's meant by that?

St. Augustine coined this timeless dictum: *You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you.* Hence, nothing in life can ever really be enough for us. We are always restless, always yearning for something more. However, in this initial phase of love, when we have fallen into the grip of emotional infatuation, for a time *the other is enough for us.* That's why Romeo and Juliet could die happy. At this stage of love, they were enough for each other.

However, the hard truth is that infatuation does not last. The other person, no matter how wonderful he or she might actually be, is not God and can never be enough (and we are unfair to him or her when we unconsciously expect them to be enough). For a while, they are able to carry that godliness for us, but that illusion of godliness will eventually break and we will realize that this is just a person, one person, wonderful perhaps, but finite, limited, and not divine. That realization (which is ultimately meant to be the ground for mature love) can, if not understood, jeopardize or sour a relationship. God invented falling in love! In it, we get a little foretaste of heaven, though, as experience tells us, that is not without its dangers.
