

# Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends.

I'd like to share with you a reflection by Sr. Jean Amore, CSJ, principal of Sacred Heart Academy. It was shared with me by a friend who is an SHA alumna.

Beginning at the age of two, we don't like much being told what to do! But in the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures, the command to love God, to love ourselves, to love one another even our enemies is different. God's command assumes the very best in us and invites us to go beyond what we think is possible. Jesus' command to love does not presume we have arrived at love once and for all. It sets us on a path of love, forgiveness, compassion, and justice. How precious is the moment when we realize we have been born with a sense of rightness, of justice, of compassion and of mercy and are summoned by God to act in this way. Lent is a time when God asks us not to shrink or cramp our capacity for expansive love.

Today, we suffer from many pandemics: COVID-19, racism, crippling political divisions, violence and life-threatening cases of "hardening of the heart." As we reflect on the Gospel readings in Lent, Jesus' anger and grieving are always in response to people who should know better, but condemn, judge, oppress and exclude. For Jesus, compassion, forgiveness and inclusion were permanent attitudes. Jesus knew that refusal to love another paralyzes the other in his/her worst moment. Lack of love anywhere diminishes love everywhere. Happy those who believe in compassion and forgiveness; theirs is a faith and legacy that change people.

#### This Lent ~

Let us fast from coldness of heart and let others know they have a safe home in our minds and hearts. Let us fast from indifference and let others know their lives matter.

Let us fast from gossip and harsh judgments and let others feel "lifted up" by our words and actions.

Let us fast from standing still when we need to walk with those dehumanized because of race, culture or social class.

Let us fast from discouragement and share hope and possibility with so many suffering in our world today: those who have lost a loved one, who are jobless, who are at the end of a relationship, who are bearing illnesses, who are ....

Lastly, let us live God's beautiful, noble and challenging summons to live an expansive love for the times in which we live. Let it include all God's integrated, interdependent creation - human and non-human.

We are not alone; we belong to each other.

May we be open to all the graces God wishes to give us this Lent.

Concretely, a way in which you have so generously shown how we follow that sublime command and demonstrate that we are in it together has been our consistent response to the Catholic Ministries Appeal. The 2021 Appeal has begun and soon you will be receiving a letter from the Bishop asking for support. Our parish goal this year is \$105, 300. I too ask for your support. Your generosity to last year's Appeal helped many and provided a needed rebate to the parish. The rebate is our largest fundraiser. Many thanks.

And,

Don't be worried about your smartphone or TV spying on you. Your vacuum cleaner has been collecting dirt on you for years.

I'm getting tired of being part of a major historical event.

I don't always go the extra mile, but when I do it's because I missed my exit.



#### LENTEN REFLECTION FOR 2021

THEN YOU BEGIN PRAYING SIMPLE PRAYERS, EASILY, REMEMBERED, SACRED HEART OF JESUS, I PLACE MY TRUST IN YOU. OR LIVE JESUS IN OUR HEARTS! My goodness, Jesus can unlock so many doors! Already I am finding unexpected opportunities to share my faith. Jesus is the key. I just have to walk through the doors that He opens.

I was talking to a neighbor recently, who had told me a year ago, when I said I would pray for her, that she "didn't believe in any of that." I told her "I did", so I would pray. She's a good person, always offering to help others in the community and she's always nice to people.

Well anyway, we were chatting curbside with another woman about our concern for a friend in rehab who wasn't doing well when somehow the subject of death came up. (Was Jesus opening a door?) I then told the two ladies about the most beautiful death I had ever experienced. (Not my own!).

Years ago, Mr. and Mrs. G and their daughter lived next door with elderly Grandma and Grandpa in a large, mother-daughter home. Grandma DiSanti would spend a few hours every Saturday morning praying for the dead and for the grace of a happy death. She had a stack of funeral holy cards on her lap, and prayed for each person individually. Meanwhile Grandpa DiSanti (who was always trying to tell me an off-color joke) would sit on his beach chair, in the sunshine, under the trees, with birds chirping and squirrels running around him.

Well one day, I told my neighbors, as the family was doing some window cleaning, someone noticed Grandpa DiSanti slipping down off his beach chair. When they ran out to see him, he had already passed on. They called Doctor M. who lived down the street. He came and pronounced Mr. DiSanti dead. Then the EMT's arrived, as well as some firemen. I watched, as they all formed a circle around Grandpa DiSanti, whose covered body lay on the driveway, and prayed, as did I. I told my friends that when I returned to my house the radio was playing a song and the words were: "Believe it or not I'm walking on air. I never thought I could feel so free! Flying away on a wing and a prayer. Who could it be? Believe it or not, it's just me!"

My neighbor gasped and her jaw dropped. She remained stunned for quite a few minutes, and I thought to myself...."Wow, Jesus!...another opportunity Thank you Jesus! Perhaps my story will leave her wondering.




If we all tried a little harder for peace in our world what a wonderful place it would be.



# A Reflection from Sister T~

Dear Friends,

Well, here we are in our first week of Lent. How are you doing? As in all things, beginnings are usually strong, but like long-distance runners, we need to keep our eye on the goal and pace ourselves. Try and keep this in mind during these weeks of Lent.

Here at the Parish, we are looking at the thought that Jesus is the key. In looking at last week's Sunday reading and the upcoming reading for this week, I recognize that Jesus is always with us. From the example of how to face temptation to being on a mountaintop with us, Jesus is ever present – even when we come down from that mountain!

If you think about it, Jesus experienced what it was like to be truly human. So, I guess for today we could say that Jesus is the key to living an abundant life with all of its ups and downs. During my lifetime I have never before experienced a time that 'exposed', if you will, humanity in its truly imperfect form. The length of this pandemic sort of reminds me of the time Jesus spent in the desert. He probably started out strong but by the end He was weary, and it was hard to fight off the temptations that were surrounding him. Are not there days that you feel like that?

We have had a year of unknowns and struggles, of loss and disbelief. How do we continue? We need to look to Jesus and see how He dealt with challenges. Prayer and time with His Father were one way. Do we spend enough time in prayer, or do we use our time to complain and place blame on others for things that are happening around us? Sometimes we just need to be silent and listen. Jesus has the answers for us; are we willing to listen, open our hearts and minds, and perhaps do some Attitude Adjustments?

We go from the desert to the mountaintop, and this time Jesus has His core group of Apostles with Him. They, like most of us, want to stay on that mountaintop. I love when this Gospel comes around, for I find myself saying 'let me build three tents' when I have experienced something good, beautiful, or exciting in my life.

That is the temptation; we would love to stay on that high. But life is not like that, it has its ups and downs. The great thing is that if we believe that Jesus was fully human, then He is the key to a full and abundant life. I think what happens is we start to decide what it means to have a full and abundant life. For some it may mean having everything they want and no pain or disappointment in their lives. For others it may mean success in all they do, great childhood, perfect marriage, and great retirement. All good things, but there are always peaks and valleys in all the landscape of life. True, some have higher peaks and others lower valleys, but the key is do we live it to the fullest. Jesus did.

If we look at Jesus being the key to an abundant life, then we need to see how He lived His human life. Our scriptures are rich with the examples of how Jesus tried to help others live abundant lives, from raising the dead to raising the dignity of women, to curing the sick to speaking out about injustices. But all of this came at a price, and Jesus was willing to pay that price.

## Saturday March 6

Micah 7:14-15,18-20 Ps 103:1-4,9-12 Luke 15:1-3,11-32 Think of a "mountaintop experience" you've had. What generated it? Did it change your life forever or was it just a momentary high?

In Biblical symbolism, a mountain represents getting close to God. Did your mountaintop experience bring you closer to God?

It was at the top of Mount Tabor where Jesus revealed the glory of his Godliness to his closest friends. Called a "high mountain" in scripture, Mount Tabor is, in reality, not huge. What was huge is the event that took place there – and why.

The three disciples who witnessed Christ's transfiguration greatly benefited from seeing his glory revealed, because someday they would be commissioned to take over his earthly ministry.

The Father told them, "This is

my beloved Son; *listen to him.*" As we listen to Jesus, it is we who are now transfigured.

Lent is meant to be a mountaintop experience for each of us. If we follow Jesus up the mountain, his light will consume any darkness within us. The more we listen to his teachings and apply them to our daily lives and ministries, the more we become like him. And the more we become like Jesus, the more our lives are transfigured by his light, and the more our lives then transfigure the world around us.



As the first reading tells us, Abraham did not withhold his son from the Lord; God the Father did not withhold his Son from us.

Likewise, we must not withhold the Son from the people we encounter. Whether it's by an evangelizing word or a helping hand,

or a compassionate and attentive ear, or the generous giving of mercy and forgiveness or money or time, we are Christ's hands and feet and voice in the world today. We are his earthly body. We are the answers to people's prayers.

We have been empowered through our baptisms to shine with the glory of Christ's love. We have all been commissioned to continue his earthly ministry. May the experience of Lent take us to new heights of union with Christ and his mission!

#### Reflect & Discuss:

- Identify one area of your life that you would like Jesus to transfigure. What do you need to do to repent of it? How do you need to change (with God's help) so that others see more of Jesus?
- 2. Share the story of a time when you let Jesus change you. How difficult was it to be transfigured? Why did you want to make the change?
- 3. How did it impact others?

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## Spiritual Reflection by Ron Rolheiser, OMI

#### THE IMPERIALISM OF THE HUMAN SOUL

In his autobiography, Nikos Kazantzakis shares how in his youth he was driven by a restlessness that had him searching for something he could never quite define. However, he made peace with his lack of peace because he accepted that, given the nature of the soul, he was supposed to feel that restlessness and that a healthy soul is a driven soul. Commenting on this, he writes: "No force anywhere on earth is as imperialistic as the human soul. It occupies and is occupied in turn, but it always considers its empire too narrow. Suffocating, it desires to conquer the world in order to breathe freely."

We need to be given permission, I believe, to accept as God-given that imperialism inside our soul, even as we need always to be careful never to trivialize its power and meaning. However, that is a formula for tension. How does one make peace with the imperialism of one's soul without denigrating the divine energy that is stoking that imperialism? For me, this has been a struggle.

I grew up in the heart of the Canadian prairies, with five hundred miles of open space in every direction. Geographically, that space let one's soul stretch out, but otherwise my world seemed too small for my soul to breathe. I grew up inside a tight-knit community in an isolated rural area where the world was small enough so that everyone knew everyone else. That was wonderful because it made for a warm cocoon; but that cocoon (seemingly) separated me from the big world where, it seemed to my young mind, souls could breathe in spaces bigger than where I was breathing. Moreover, growing up with an acute religious and moral sensitivity, I felt guilty about my restlessness, as if it were something abnormal that I needed to hide.

In that state, as an eighteen-year-old, I entered religious life. Novitiates in those days were quite strict and secluded. We were eighteen of us, novices, sequestered in an old seminary building across a lake from a town and a highway. We could hear the sounds of traffic and see life on the other side of the lake, but we were not part of it. As well, most everything inside our sequestered life focused on the spiritual so that even our most earthy desires had to be associated with our hunger for God and for the bread of life. Not an easy task for anyone, especially a teenager.

Well, one day we were visited by a priest who gave my soul permission to breathe. He gathered us, the eighteen novices, into a classroom and began his conference with this question: Are you feeling a little restless? We nodded, rather surprised by the question. He went on: Well, you should be feeling restless! You must be jumping out of your skin! All that life in you and all those fiery hormones stirring in your blood, and you're stuck here watching life happen across the lake! You must be going crazy sometimes! But ... that's good, that's what you should be feeling, it shows you're healthy. Stay with it. You can do this. It's good to feel that restlessness.

That day the wide-open prairie spaces I had lived my whole life in and the wide-open spaces in my soul befriended each other a little. And that friendship continued to grow as I did my studies and read authors who had befriended their souls. Among others, these spoke to me: St. Augustine (You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you.); Thomas Aquinas (The adequate object of the human intellect and will is all Being); Iris Murdoch (The deepest of all human pains is the pain of the inadequacy of self-expression); Karl Rahner (In the torment of the insufficiency of everything attainable, we ultimately learn that here, in this life, there is no finished symphony); Sidney Callahan (We are made to ultimately sleep with the whole world, is it any wonder that we long for this along the way?); and James Hillman (Neither religion nor psychology really honors the human soul. Religion is forever trying to save the soul and psychology is always trying to fix the soul. The soul needs neither to be saved nor fixed; it is already eternal – it just needs to be listened to.)

Perhaps today the real struggle is not so much to accept sacred permission to befriend the wild insatiability of the soul. The greater struggle today, I suspect, is not to trivialize the soul, not to make its infinite longings something less than what they are.

During the World War II, Jesuit theologians resisting the Nazi occupation in France published an underground newspaper. The first issue opened with this now-famous line: *France, take care not to lose your soul.* Fair warning. The soul is imperialistic because it carries divine fire and so it struggles to breathe freely in the world. To feel and to honor that struggle is to be healthy.
