

Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

"Can you drink the cup?"

When Jesus asks this in today's gospel, the disciples reply with a strong "yes, we can!" They are confident. Yet, we know that as the reality of drinking that cup entails, their confidence often wanes – sometimes greatly. Might this apply to us? Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP, reflects:

Haven't we said, "We can" with enthusiasm to some call we have heard? A call to: marriage; a profession or job we thought would be a help to people; a ministry in our parish; volunteer work in our community; religious life or priesthood, etc.? We responded with joy and enthusiasm and said, "We can." That was "before."

"Later" we came to know the sacrifice that was also being asked of us. That's when we realized we needed the help of the resurrected Christ and so we prayed and came to Eucharist with a need for strength, perseverance and nourishment — which we received and depend upon again and again. The "before" was our response to vocation. The "later" is our reality check when we realize we cannot do it on our own, but need help if we were to follow Christ's example as servant. In the Lord's Prayer today we will pray for that help as we once again ask for "daily bread."

I was delighted last Friday evening as our parishioner, Georgia "Duchess" Priebe, was honored by the Diocese for her 24,589 hours of service to St. Catherine of Siena Medical Center! Yes, you read it correctly, 24, 589. Georgia ministered in SSPJ as first Director of Religious Education and after retirement in her spare time continues to minister in SSPJ as reader, extraordinary minister of the Eucharist and as a leader in our RCIA ministry. Filled with feisty energy, faith and generosity, Georgia is an exemplary Apostle of Hope. Thanks, Duchess! We love you!

Speaker: Mark J. Houck, President & Founder of The King's Men **Topic:** The Spiritual Dangers of Pornography

Considered debased only fifty years ago, pornography in our culture has become mainstream and socially acceptable, as the internet has made it readily accessible and ubiquitous. In our country a new pornography film is produced every 39 minutes, and the sex media industry makes more money than all professional baseball, basketball and football franchises combined. As followers of Christ we are called to a greater dignity, but watching porn impedes spiritual growth and is so spiritually damaging to the soul, the mind, and especially to one's most important relationships (with God, spouse, children). "For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit, and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you would" (Galatians 5:17). Do we make excuses and tolerate viewing some pornography in our lives? Do we truly believe that God's grace can overcome any such habit? Our speaker Mark Houck will challenge us as men of Christ and explain how grace can turn us from pornography to purity, so that freed from lust we might be free to love like Christ.


It's Leo and Sister T talking .. RCIA Again!


<u>Leo</u>: That's great. I was wondering, what could I say to someone who wanted to know what it was like being a Christian.

St. Patrick Parish Social Ministry Rainbows

Rainbows... when something significant happens in the family, the entire family is affected; and grieving children struggle to verbalize the complex, emotions inside. Rainbows is a support group curriculum for children who have suffered a loss in their lives, either by death, by divorce, or any other painful transition.

This program is not a counseling session or therapy; it is *strictly* a peer support group with caring trained adults to guide them. The purpose of the curriculum is to provide these children with an opportunity to sort through and understand their grief, helping them come to a healthy acceptance of what has happened in their family. The children, as well as the adults, are bound by confidentiality.

Format

- · 12 sessions divided into two six week semesters (fall & winter).
- Each session runs approximately one hour per week. The children are grouped according to age level. (ages 5-17)
- . Meet in St. Patrick School on Wednesday evenings at 7:00PM







Reflection-

But what they missed was how our Lord was leading them by example. As they were aspiring to the "power" of the world, Jesus tried to show them that *real* power, expresses itself in loving service, in giving oneself for others.


Music Ministry

Reflections on Next Sunday's Scripture Readings

Jeremiah 31:7-9 Psalm 126 Hebrews 5:1-6 Mark 10:46-52

Today's readings show that, even in the most desperate moment, we are able to find God dynamically present, a God who pierces the darkness and offers us the grace of hope and new life.

Jeremiah addresses the northern tribes of Israel, the surviving remnant after the kingdom has fallen. The prophet calls for a revival of hope, a renewal of faith in Yahweh who saves. Jeremiah offers a poignant contrast -- the tearful departure versus the joyous return. Just as in the first exodus, Yahweh will provide a level road with an abundant supply of water.

Psalm 126 is a communal lament that echoes the despair and then the joy of the Babylonian exiles. Yahweh's goodness to these exiles seemed like a dream; even the enemy had to remark, "The Lord has done great things for them" (Psalm 126:2).

For Mark, the cure of the blind Bartimaeus has great symbolic value. This account follows the blind ambition of James and John, and introduces the transition of Jesus' ministry to Jerusalem. For Mark, discipleship is the ability to hope for glory in and through suffering. The true disciple is the one who can see the exaltation of Jesus in and through his passion and death.

Disillusionment is part of the human experience. The light can seem to turn into darkness when there is loss or trouble in life. Christian faith is the ability to see through depression and despair, to see a God waiting to save. Hope is the capacity to see anew.

BEYOND CRITICISM AND ANGER - THE INVITATION TO A DEEPER EMPATHY

Recently I attended a symposium where the keynote speaker was a man exactly my age. Since we had both lived through the same cultural and religious changes in our lives, I resonated with much of what he said and with how he felt about things. And in his assessment of both the state of affairs in our politics and our churches today, he was pretty critical, even angry. Not without reason. In both our governments and our churches today there isn't just a bitter polarization and an absence of fundamental charity and respect, there's also a lot of seemingly inexcusable blindness, lack of transparency, and self-serving dishonesty. Our speaker was plenty eager to point these out.

And for the most part, I agreed with him. I feel the same way that he does. The current state of affairs, whether you're looking at politics or the churches, is depressing, bitterly polarized, and cannot but leave you feeling frustrated and accusatory at those whom you deem responsible for the blindness, dishonesty, and injustice that seem inexcusable. But, while I shared much of his truth and his feelings, I didn't share where he landed. He landed in pessimism and anger, seemingly unable to find anything other than indignation within which to stand. He also ended very negative in terms of his attitude towards those whom he blames for the problem.

I can't fault his truth and I can't fault his feelings. They're understandable. But I'm not at ease with where he landed. Bitterness and anger, no matter how justified, are not a good place to stay. Both Jesus and what's noble inside of us invite us to move beyond anger and indignation.

Beyond anger, beyond indignation, and beyond justified criticism of all that's dishonest and unjust, lies an invitation to a deeper empathy. This invitation doesn't ask us to be stop being prophetic in the face of what's wrong but it asks us to be prophetic in a deeper way. A prophet, as Daniel Berrigan so often said, makes a vow of love not of alienation.

But that's not easy to do. In the face of injustice, dishonesty, and willful blindness, all of our natural instincts militate against empathy. Up to a point, this is healthy and shows that we're still morally robust. We should feel anger and indignation in the face of what's wrong. It's understandable too that we might also feel some hateful, judgmental, thoughts towards those whom we deem responsible. But that's a beginning (a healthy enough starting point) but it's not where we're meant to stay. We're called to move towards something deeper, namely, an empathy which previously we did not access. Deep anger invites deep empathy.

At the truly bitter moments of our lives, when we're feeling overwhelmed by feelings of misunderstanding, slight, injustice, and rightful indignation and we're staring across at those whom we deem responsible for the situation, anger and hatred will naturally arise within us. It's okay to dwell with them for a time (because anger is an important mode of grieving) but, after a time we need to move on. The challenge then is to ask ourselves: How do I love now, given all this hatred? What does love call me to now in this bitter situation? Where can I now find a common thread that can keep me in family with those at whom I'm angry? How do I reach through, reach through the space that now leaves me separated by my own justified feelings of anger? And, perhaps most important of all: "From where can I now find the strength to not give into hatred and self-serving indignation?

How am I called to love now? How do I love in this new situation? That's the challenge. We've never before been called upon to love in a situation like this. Our understanding, empathy, forgiveness, and love have never before been tested in this way. But that's the ultimate moral challenge, the "test" that Jesus himself faced in Gethsemane. How do you love when everything around you invites you to the opposite?

Almost all of our natural instincts militate against this kind of empathy, as does most everything around us. In the face of injustice our natural instincts spontaneously begin, one by one, to shut the doors of trust and make us judgmental. They also invite us to feel indignation and hatred. Now those feelings do produce a certain catharsis in us. It feels good. But that kind of cathartic feeling is a drug that doesn't do much for us long range. We need something beyond feelings of bitterness and hatred for our long range health. Empathy is that something.

While not denying what's wrong, nor denying the need to be prophetic in the face of all that's wrong, empathy still calls us to a post-anger, a post-indignation, and a post-hatred. Jesus modeled that for us and today it's singularly the most needed thing in our society, our churches, and our families.
