Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Today's gospel is the end of the story of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus who come to recognize Jesus in the Breaking of the Bread. Think about all the "roads" we travel in our lifetime. How readily do we recognize Jesus along the way? Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP, reminds us:

Life is never static for us. It is always in flux, we are "on the road." Along the way the risen Christ appears to us and like his disciples: we don't immediately recognize him. But he would be more readily recognizable to us if we followed the guidance of these resurrection stories: continue to gather in community, especially in hard times; break open the Word for one another; share the bread and wine of the Eucharist and then, well prepared, witness to the risen Christ through our words and actions to help others come to believe that, "He is risen!"

During this Easter season we hear much from the Acts of the Apostles – and one of the aspects of the early church is their gathering as community. Members of our SSPJ community will gather this Tuesday, April 16th, as Bishop Luis Miguel Romero will confirm our young people who have been preparing to celebrate the sacrament of Confirmation over the past years. Many thanks to Dominick Avento, Confirmation coordinator, and those catechists who have ministered with him in readying our young ones for this day. As part of our witness to community, please be sure to keep them in your prayers.

Our commitment to community is also evidenced through our support of the Catholic Ministries Appeal. Monies raised through CMA touch the lives of many in need in our diocese through direct services, through counseling, through healthcare, through education and more. Many thanks to all who have pledged and contributed to CMA. We are still hoping to reach our parish goal by the end of the Easter season - Pentecost which this year falls on May 19th. I ask you to pray for all assisted by CMA, and also to prayerfully consider making a pledge or one time donation if you have not already done so.

And finally,

Dear Friends,

Happy Easter Season! Let all the Alleluias ring out! As we journey though this beautiful time in the church year, I was fortunate enough to obtain a new perspective on the word EASTER. Our Deacon John Keenan shared with us in the homily that during this season we need to continue to encounter and develop our relationship with the Risen Lord and let Christ 'EASTER in us'.

Although that expression may not sound familiar to us that is because we treat Easter as a noun, a moment in history. Easter is not just a noun but first and foremost a verb. Easter is something we think, something we feel, something we graciously accept and most of all something we do. Easter has become a way of loving, living, seeing, hearing, and speaking. We are called to do Easter every day.

I share with you the prayer that our Deacon John shared with us, and I think you will find many ideas that can be reflected on.

"Lord Jesus, Easter in us, that we may live our lives in the light of your compassion and peace, your justice and forgiveness. Easter in us that we may become a humble servant like you, a healer like you, a teacher like you, a foot washer like you. Easter in us that we may bear our crosses for one another as you have borne your cross for us. Easter in us so that we may live the true joy of resurrection rather than the tears of the tomb. Lord Jesus Easter in us today and every day so that at the end of our life's voyage, we may EASTER in you. Amen"

This alone is powerful but God has great timing and as I was putting this together a great quote from Pope Francis came across my desk, I think it concretizes Easter as a verb. Here you go:

"Rivers do not drink their own water; trees do not eat their own fruit; the sun does not shine on itself, and flowers do not spread their fragrance for themselves. Living for others is a rule of nature. We are born to help each other. No matter how difficult it is...Life is good when you are happy; but much better when others are happy because of you." Pope Francis

May your week be filled with Resurrection joy and many opportunities to use **EASTER** as a verb!!!



Saturday, April 27 Acts 13:44-52 Ps 98:1-4 Jn 14:7-14 As a child, I always loved hearing about Jesus the Good Shepherd and seeing pictures of our Lord holding His staff in one hand, surrounded by a herd of fluffy sheep, and with one wayward sheep always curled around His shoulders. I was comforted by this image of Jesus, who loved all His sheep, even those who lost their way and took off in the wrong direction.

This parable offers a much deeper meaning to me now as an adult. Jesus is the Good Shepherd who laid down His life to help me – a sinner who is so prone to going astray. He suffered, died on the cross, and rose from the dead to lead me and all of God's children (His sheep) on the right path to heaven.

He knows me by name and restores my soul with grace from the Sacraments. He safeguards my steps from the snares of the Evil One through the guidance and wisdom of the Holy Spirit alive in the one, holy, Catholic, and apostolic Church. He sometimes allows me to make wrong turns, but because I know and love Him, I can trust that

He is always right there, ready to bring me back into the fold.

Through the living waters of Baptism and the gift of the Holy Spirit, Christians are called and empowered to become like Jesus and be good shepherds, too. In His image, we must forgive those who are lost and do our part to bring them back into God's embrace. We must live our lives in joy and compassion for others – especially the poor, the downcast, and the lost – who most need God's mercy. Trusting in the wise voice and directions of the Good Shepherd, we



must never be afraid to speak God's truth and wisdom with love and grace to correct those who are astray and having trouble finding their way. As worthy shepherds, we must pray for courage to stay loyal to Christ, the Good Shepherd, in our everyday thoughts, words, and actions, whether alone, with family, at work, at church, in politics, in science, or interacting with media.

Remember that Jesus and the Church have been associated with controversy from the beginning, but He promises victory in the end. We must hold on tightly in faith, help others know and love Christ, and shepherd them into the loving gate of our Savior.

- In which areas of your life do you most need shepherding to stay on the right path to heaven?

- What are some ways we can hear the voice of the Good Shepherd? How can we protect ourselves from being snatched by Satan?
- + How do we lay down our lives for others when we are a good shepherd?

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GO CRAZY OR TURN HOLY

In a poem *Serenade,* Brazilian poet Adelia Pradospeaks of a painful ache we feel inside us as we forever wait for something or someone to come and make us whole. What are we waiting for? Love? A soulmate? God? No matter, the frustration eventually pushes us towards a choice, go crazy or turn holy:

I am beginning to despair

And can see only two choices:

Either go crazy or turn holy.

And when that someone or something finally does come:

How will I open the window, unless I'm crazy? How will I close it, unless I'm holy?

Either go crazy or turn holy. The older we get the more we realize how true that is, how eventually that's the choice forced on all of us, both by the way we are built and the limitations inherent in life itself. Why? Is there something wrong with life and with us? Why can't we find a peaceful space somewhere between crazy and holy?

Well, the biblical preacher in the Book of Ecclesiastes offers a reason. After penning that beautiful, oft-quoted text about how there is a time for everything – *a time to be born and to a time to die; a time to plant and a time to harvest; a time to break down and a time to heal; a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to mourn and a time to dance; a time to embrace and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to keep silent and a time to speak; a time for love and a time for hate; and a time for war and a time for peace – he offers us this. God has laid out a beautiful rhythm for life and has made everything beautiful in its own time, but God has put <i>timelessness* into the human heart so that we are out of sync with the seasons from beginning to end. God has established a beautiful rhythm to nature; but we, unlike the physical elements and the plants and the animals who don't have timelessness in their souls, never quite fit into that rhythm. We are overcharged for life on this planet. (Ecclesiastes 3, 1-11)

You find expressions of this in literature everywhere in both religious and secular circles. For example, the renowned German theologian Karl Rahner used to affirm that *in the torment of the insufficiency of everything attainable we learn that here in this life there is no finished symphony.* In that, he echoes Saint Augustine's famous line that is as true and apropos today as it was seventeen hundred years ago when he wrote it: *You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you.* That single line expresses both a non-negotiable understanding of the human person and a non-negotiable path he or she must walk. We don't have a final home here and that's why at the end of the day there is no option other than going crazy or turning holy. It's no surprise that Ruth Burrows, the renowned spiritual writer, begins her autobiography with these words: *I was born into this world with a tortured sensitivity and my path has not been an easy one.*

While this motif is everywhere present in religious literature, it is also present in the thought of many secular poets, novelists, and philosophers. For instance, after he won the Nobel Prize for Literature, Albert Camus, a professed atheist, was asked by a journalist if he believed in God. He answered: No, I don't believe in God, but that doesn't mean I am not obsessed with the question of God. Why that obsession? Because in his thought he could not make sense of the world, nor find a fully sensible place in it for humans, unless there was a God. Without a God, human existence cannot make peace with itself. He likened the condition of someone in this world to that of a prisoner in certain medieval prisons, where they would put a prisoner in a cell that was so small that he or she could never stand fully upright or ever fully stretch out. The perpetual feeling of being cramped, it was believed, would eventually break the prisoner's spirit. For Camus, that's our situation in life. We can never really stand up fully or ever stretch out fully. Eventually, this breaks our spirit – and we either go crazy or get holy. That's also the basic view of other atheistic existentialists like Martin Heidegger and Jean-Paul Sartre.

Go crazy or get holy! Richard Rohr offers us a third option, get bitter. He submits that once we get to a certain age, we have only three options left open to us: We can become *a pathetic old fool*; or we can become *a bitter old fool*; or we can become *a holy old fool*. Notice what's non-negotiable. We will all eventually become old fools. We have the choice only as to what kind of old fool we will be – crazy, bitter, or holy.
