

Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

In his publication "First Impressions", Fr. Jude Siciliano quotes Fr. Robert Waznak who gives some good directions for Apostles of Hope:

In an Advent homily, Robert Waznak, SS, tells us something he saw that sparked his Advent hope. He was driving by an elementary school and saw a teacher with her class of students. They weren't putting up Christmas lights, or a Santa display. Instead, they were digging holes in the newly-frozen ground to plant a tiny bulbs for the coming of Spring. "She was teaching them something about expecting promises to be fulfilled".

This is what prophets like Baruch do – preach hope. Baruch was speaking to a decimated people who saw nothing good to hope for in their future. Still, he dug holes in the hard-packed earth of his people's despair by his preaching. The Babylonians were about to destroy the southern kingdom of Judah and Jerusalem and then take the leading citizens into exile. The defeated people in exile would need Baruch's dazzling promises, "For God is leading Israel in joy by the light of his glory with God's mercy and justice for company."

Unexpectedly last Thursday we were notified by the Ursuline Sisters in Blue Point that they were having an estate sale as they prepare to move from their motherhouse. The sale took place the following day! We were able to purchase the altar and ambo used by the sisters in their retreat center. These will be used downstairs in the auditorium, thus enhancing the sacredness of our gatherings there. You will also notice that the cross in the auditorium has been replaced with one that is more proportional to the size of the room, also adding to the prayerful environment.

We were also able to acquire from the sisters a number of crucifixes which will be placed in the Bethany Center classrooms. If anyone would like to contribute to the cost of these acquisitions, perhaps as a memorial donation, please contact the rectory.

On the feast of our Lady of Guadalupe, Wednesday, December 12th, we are very happy to host the school Christmas concert at 7pm in the church. All of us are welcome to attend.

On Monday evening, December 17th, at 7pm in the church we will again celebrate our Communal Reconciliation Service. Come, celebrate this wonderful sacrament as we *ready the way of the Lord!*

Many thanks to all who are supporting our Pick A Star program as we attempt to share the blessings we have received with others who may be less fortunate. This is a beautiful way to honor the presence of Emmanuel - God-with-us.

As we get closer to Christmas day many more people will gather to celebrate with us. I ask you to please be attentive and welcoming to all. Our warm smiles and hearty voices can encourage those around us to enter more fully into the liturgy, allowing God's love to be born anew in each of us.

And,

While working for an organization that delivers lunches to elderly shut-ins, I used to take my 4-year-old daughter on my afternoon rounds. She was unfailingly intrigued by the various appliances of old age, particularly the canes, walkers and wheelchairs. One day I found her staring at a pair of false teeth soaking in a glass. As I braced myself for the inevitable barrage of questions, she merely turned and whispered, 'The tooth fairy will never believe this!'

181 children attended SS. Philip & James School – 113 from within our parish, 56 from neighboring parishes, and 12 children who are not of the Catholic faith

SS Philip & James is served by 130 Eucharistic Ministers and 35 of them serve homebound parishioners as well as senior residents of St. James Health Care, Mills Pond Nursing Home, and Smithtown Health Center.

Our Parish is also blessed with 41 lectors, 17 student lectors, 27 ushers, and 94 altar servers (85 children and 9 adult)

Our Parish, Our Faith, Our Family



When we respond generously to God's call we create a beautiful community in which the vision, light and life of Christ is alive and on fire in our parish and within each one of us.

Building a parish reaches far beyond the refurbishing of a building, installing a new HVAC system or beautifying our parking lot.

This has been a terrible scandal ridden year for the Catholic Church and yet we pledge ourselves to the hard and necessary work of reformation. The universal church has made that pledge and we have acted on that pledge here at SSPJ.

Numbers have dwindled throughout the Catholic world in both attendance and financial support. The hard truth is that we cannot do it without your increased support. The church faces the same budgetary issues as you do. The ever-rising cost of heating and electricity puts a tremendous strain on our budget. The unfortunate escalation of violence in our country necessitates the need for new and updated security measures within our campus. Changes in FCC requirements occasion a minimal \$50,000 upgrade to our sound systems. To maintain our budget and allow for the increase in the new minimum wage there was a need to reduce the office hours.

We are happy to report that with the assistance of many volunteers and a strong hold on a very tight budget the parish was able to finish our fiscal year in the black with a small margin of \$18,000.

Our school last year experienced a decrease in enrollment which led to a deficit of \$43,000. With a strong new school administration, we have seen that reversed and are confident in the continued growth of our school. A nursery school program has been initiated and we have seen an increase in enrollment in all grade levels.

The Diocese mandates that 15% of our yearly revenue be used to support a parish or regional school. The school administration, faculty and parents are very aware of the tremendous support the parish offers them and in addition to their tuition they are mandated by the diocese to raise \$100,000 through fundraising to off-set the operational cost of the school.

While sincerely thanking you for your support of the parish we respectfully ask that if possible you might consider increasing your support by 3-5 dollars per week. We need your help and support to continue to build up the gospel vision given to us by Jesus, our Lord.






RCIA, where is Leo?

SSPJ Retreat 2018 Reflection

This year's retreat theme was "Reach the Peak". No one simply stumbles upon a mountain and decides to climb it.

Instead, something in their life leads them to choose to do something treacherous like climbing a mountain.

Much like that of a mountain climber, my retreat story needs a bit of background. I grew up attending St.Patrick's Church in Smithtown. I had always had a personal connection to God but no one else around me had faith. I saw the family-like bond of the SSPJ Youth Group and knew that I belonged in a community that was open and happy to share their love of God. This is what led me to attend retreat.

Retreat not only allowed me to share my faith, but truly led it to flourish. Both the adult and youth leaders establish an accepting atmosphere for everyone to express personal struggles and how they use their faith to get through them. In our smaller group discussions people who come to retreat as strangers leave knowing each others deepest hardships.

The climb would not be possible if we weren't all ready to give each other a little support. One of my favorite aspects of retreat was the kindness key, a key on a chain that was passed around when the wearer saw someone doing a nice act. Reflections on Next Sunday's Scripture Readings

Zephaniah 3:14-18a Isaiah 12:2-3,4,5-6 Philippians 4:4-7 Luke 3:10-18

We believe that God created the world. We believe that Jesus redeemed us by his dying and rising. We believe that the Spirit came upon the Church at Pentecost. We also may regard all of these divine actions as finished once and for all. How then do we see God's ongoing presence in the world? This weekend's Scripture makes God's presence an occasion for gratitude and joy.

Zephaniah preached in the southern kingdom of Judah between 640 and 630 B.C. The country was suffering moral decay. The prophet condemned the people but also offered hope. The presence of Yahweh will banish fear. The presence of the Lord will provoke a call to the renewal of mutual love.

The responsorial psalm comes from the twelfth chapter of Isaiah. The author expounds a theology of divine presence. Fear and panic must yield to trust. He speaks of the well, a typical place for remembering Yahweh's deliverance (see Judges 5:11). The people will experience God's saving presence there.

Luke presents two dimensions of the John the Baptist's preaching: ethical and messianic. On the ethical side, John addresses the crowds, the tax collectors, and the soldiers. His message is one of concern for others. Under the messianic dimension, Luke offers a theology of presence -- Jesus is bearer of the Spirit.

Creation, Incarnation, and Pentecost are ongoing realities for the modern believer. The Christian who overcomes despair assists God in a new Creation. The Christian who reaches out to the lowly continues the Incarnation. The Christian who restores life to the despondent shares in the eternal Pentecost.

A DIFFERENT KIND OF BUCKET-LIST

What's still unfinished in your life?

Well, there's always a lot that's unfinished in everyone's life. Nothing is ever really finished. Our lives, it seems, are simply interrupted by our dying. Most of us don't complete our lives, we just run out of time. So, consciously or unconsciously, we make a bucket-list of things we still want to see, do, and finish before we die.

What do we still want to do? A number of things probably immediately come to the fore: We want to see our children grow up. We want to see our daughter's wedding. We want to see our grandchildren. We want to finish this last work of art, of writing, of building. We want to see our 80th birthday. We want to reconcile with our family.

Beyond these, more important things, we generally have another list of things we were too busy, preoccupied, or economically disadvantaged to do earlier in life: We want to walk the Camino, travel to the Holy Land, see the historical sites of Europe, backpack through parts of Asia, travel the country with our grandkids, enjoy our retirement.

But in fantasizing about what's unfinished in our lives there's the danger of missing out on the richness of what's actually going on in our lives and our real task in the moment. The better question is: How do I want to live now so as to be ready to die when it's my time?

In a wonderful little book on contemplation, *Biography of Silence*, Spanish author, Pablo d'Ors, stares his mortality in the face and decides that this is what he wants to do in face of the inalienable fact that he's one day to die. Here's his bucket list: "I have decided to stand up and open my eyes. I have decided to eat and drink in moderation, to sleep as necessary, to write only what contributes toward improving those who read me, to abstain from greed, and never compare myself to others. I have also decided to water my plants and care for an animal. I will visit the sick, I will converse with the lonely, and I will not let much time go by before playing with a child. In the same manner I have decided to recite my prayers every day, to bow several times before the things I consider sacred, to celebrate the Eucharist, to listen to the Word, to break bread and share the wine, to give peace, to sing in unison. And to go for walks, which I find essential. And to light the fire, which is also essential. And to shop without hurry, to greet my neighbors even when I do not like seeing their faces, to subscribe to a newspaper, to regularly call my friends and siblings on the phone. And to take excursions, swim in the sea at least once a year, and to read only good books, or reread those that I have liked. ... I will live for those things according to an ethics of attention and care. And this is how I will arrive at a happy old age, when I will contemplate, humble and proud at the same time, the small but grand orchard that I have cultivated. Life as cult, culture, and cultivation."

Life as a cult, culture, and cultivation: I'm a two-time cancer survivor. When first diagnosed with cancer seven years ago, the prognosis was good. I had a scare, but time still stretched out endlessly before me. But when the cancer returned four years ago, the doctors were less optimistic and told me, in unequivocal terms, that my time was probably short, no more endless days. That prognosis clarified my thoughts and feelings as nothing ever before. Stunned, I went home, sat down in prayer, and then wrote this mini-creed for myself, with a different kind of bucket-list:

I am going to strive to be as productive as long as I can.

I am going to make every day and every activity as precious and enjoyable as possible.

I am going to strive to be as gracious, warm, and charitable as possible.

I am going to strive to be as healthy as long as I can.

I am going to strive to accept others' love in a deeper way than I have up to now.

I am going to strive to live a more-fully "reconciled" life. No room for past hurts anymore.

I am going to strive to keep my sense of humor intact.

I am going to strive to be as courageous and brave as I can.
