
**Confirmation**-Seventh and Eighth grade students are prepared to celebrate through Religious Ed or SSPJ School. Adults prepare through RCIA.

#### While Father Tom is away, A Reflection from Sister T

#### August 17, 2022

**Recently I had the pleasure of visiting the Jersey shore, thanks to the generosity of a dear friend.** While I was there, I sat by the ocean for several hours and just listened to the roar of the waves. While soaking in the beautiful sights and sounds of the shore, I was reminded of how powerful the water truly is.

This led me to reflect on other things that are very powerful. Since I had received an email earlier in the day that perhaps could have been written differently, I said to myself "words are powerful too!" They can build people up just as easily as they can tear them down. It made me stop and think: do I use my words carefully?

Some ordinary people who had great opportunity to use their words for good were the Prophets. The words of Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, Micah, Ezekiel, and Jesus were very powerful indeed. Although they could have been viewed as condemning people, this is not so; they were crying out to help them to become aware of the way they were living. The prophets spoke of being faithful to God, of loving without measure, of being steadfast in adversity, and being more aware of our lives' situations. The prophet's words, whether from thousands of years ago or now, are challenging. There will always be an element of judgement in their speech, but it will be coupled with compassion. You truly can't have one without the other.

So, what about me, us? How and what words to we speak? Do we encourage people, or are we harsh and condemning? Am I capable of taming my tongue? (James 3:1-18 raised that question.) Do we say things we later regret? Why is it so much easier to jump on the bandwagon of hate and cruelty in word and action than to encourage people who may need the extra TLC? Are we capable of seeing an unjust situation and dealing with it in a compassionate way?

I recently read somewhere that before you speak you should take a piece of paper, crumple it up into a ball then try and smooth it out again. The creases you created will always be there, impossible to erase or ignore. So it is with people; once words are spoken, they can't be taken back, and we will always bear the mark of whatever harm they may do.

The power of water and the power of words. I think at times, it is easier to deal with the power of water! Once I remember saying to a Sister that I just loved creation. Her response to me was "that is easy! Loving people is the challenge". She was so right, especially when we speak of how we treat one another. Nature doesn't talk back!

Spend some time this week thinking about the power of your words. How do you see your words affecting those around you? Can you learn to tame your tongue? The power lies within all of us; how do you wield the power of your words? Hopefully, with compassion.

#### AS WE NEAR THE START OF A NEW SCHOOL YEAR... (Taken from The Sunday Visitor)

Kids need more than stuff to be successful in school (and in life). They need a strong foundation of faith. Outfit your kids' spiritual backpacks with the equipment they need.

#### Compass

Your student may still be learning east from west, but with a compass, they will always know right from wrong!, The Moral Compass can be there when you aren't. With care and regular use, your child will be as wise as King Solomon!

Parent part: Pray the following together before heading out the door: "God, help me make choices today that honor you, others and myself."

#### Dictionary

Words are the currency of any education, so make sure your child has the right ones at the ready. A dictionary contains some of the most powerful words in our vocabulary. Use them alone ("please") or in popular combinations ("thank you" and "I'm sorry"), and your child will move to the head of the class in no time!

Parent Part: Share the words of Pope Francis: "Above this door are written three words that we have already used other times: May I, thank you, and I'm sorry ... in their genuine sense of respect and desire for good, they are far away from any hypocrisy and duplicity."

#### Eraser

We all make mistakes. Whether giving or receiving, the sharp, pink Eraser of Forgiveness can turn the darkest of marks into shavings blown away with a single puff. Sure, it's important to remind our young scholars to be careful with their words (not all of them are so easily erased). But it's just as critical that they have a tool at the ready to fix the mistakes they make whenever they can.

Parent Part: Talk with your child about how it feels to ask forgiveness. How does it feel to offer forgiveness? (Does it feel a little like erasing our sins and starting from a clean slate?)

#### **Day Planner**

Life happens one day at a time. A Calendar/Planner will help your little time traveler see what's ahead of them and what's behind them while keeping a foot planted firmly in the gift of the present. With plenty of space for their memories and an almost infinite number of pages for new experiences, the Calendar/Planner can hold it all.

Parent Part: Measure how far your child has grown by talking with them about what it means to be a kid at their age. Heading off to school means they "get" to do a lot of the stuff they couldn't when they were younger.

#### Glue

School can be bumpy. A dab of Friendship (glue) can be just what the doctor ordered when cracks or chips appear in your student's confidence. The bonds of Friendship will teach your kids that relationships can be "sticky": sticking together; sticking up for someone being teased; sticking around when relationships with classmates get hard.

Parent Part: Model strong friendships for your child by being a good friend to the people in your life. Talk about the things you do for friends without any expectation of something in return.

Saturday September 3 St. Gregory the Great 1 Corinthians 4:6b-15 Ps 145:17-21 Luke 6:1-5 This Sunday's Gospel reading raises the question: What are my expectations (my motivations) when I do good? How other-centered are they? How *self*-centered?

If benefiting others is done for the sake of receiving something in return, our motive is not Christ-like.

Jesus explains this with the example of inviting to a banquet those who cannot return the favor. He's not saying that we have to do this to be holy. That interpretation would be too literal; it misses the point.

The real message is that whatever we do, we should do it for the sake of love, rather than for repayment, i.e., for our own gain. We should do good to others for the sake of the benefit it will give to them. This seems like a nobrainer, but stop for a minute to think about how much you'd like to be thanked and appreciated. What else do

you hope to get from the good you do?

Even when someone sins against us and we pray for them to repent, our prayer should be offered out of concern for their souls. Sure, we also wish they would change so that our own lives will be easier, but that should not be our primary concern.

As followers of Christ, if we receive any blessings in return for the good we do, that's our bonus, not our motive. We can rightly look forward to such bonuses, but our joy does not depend on them.



By becoming aware of our motives and expectations, we gain the freedom to

choose to be more like Jesus. As he promised, "You will receive your reward at the resurrection of the righteous." The fulfillment of this promise begins now, in the moment that we decide to be like the Resurrected One, our Lord Jesus.

The reward he gives us here and now is the grace that enables us to do whatever he asks and to do it generously and cheerfully. We'll receive other blessings besides, but that's not our main motive.

#### Reflect & Discuss:

- How upset do you get when others treat you unkindly after you've been nice to them?
- 2. When the give-and-take in a relationship is unequal, do you withhold goodness from that person?
- Ask the Holy Spirit to help you notice your selfish motives this week. Take your anger to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and ask Jesus to empower you to care more about those people who have been upsetting you.
- Describe a situation when you gave more than you received. How did God bless you in that? How was your sacrifice an example of Christ?

# ONE GOD, ONE GUIDANCE SYSTEM, AND ONE ROAD FOR US ALL

At the end of the day, all of us, believers and non-believers, pious and impious, share one common humanity and all end up on the same road. This has many implications.

It's no secret that today religious practice is plummeting radically everywhere in the secular world. Those who are opting out don't all look the same, nor go by the same name. Some are *atheists*, explicitly denying the existence God. Others are *agnostics*, open to the accepting the existence of God but remaining undecided. Others self-define as *nones;* asked what faith they belong to they respond by saying none. There are those who define themselves as *dones*, done with religion and done with church. Then there are the *procrastinators*, persons who know that someday they will have to deal with the religious question, but, like Saint Augustine, keep saying, *eventually I need to do this, but not yet!* Finally, there's that huge group who define themselves as *spiritual-but-not-religious*, saying they believe in God but not in institutionalized religion.

All of us know people who are in one or several of these categories and are anxious about them. What can we do, if anything, to nudge these people towards faith, religion, and church? What will happen if they die in this state? Where does God stand in the face of this?

I suspect that God doesn't much share our anxiety here, not that God sees this as perfectly healthy (*humans are human!*), but rather that God has a larger perspective on it, is infinitely loving, and is longsuffering in patience while tolerating our choices. Why? What's God's larger perspective here?

First, the fact that our faith already baptizes those we love. Gabriel Marcel once famously stated, *To say to someone 'I love you' is to say, 'you will never be lost'.* As Christians, we understand this in terms of our unity inside the Body of Christ. Our love for someone links him or her to us, and since we are part of the Body of Christ, he or she too is linked to the Body of Christ, and to touch Christ is to touch grace. Thanks to the marvels of the Incarnation, every sincere Christian can say, 'my heaven includes this or that particular person whom I love.' We used to call this "baptism by desire", except that in this instance the desire for "baptism" is on our part, but still equally efficacious.

Next, we need to recognize that God loves these persons more than we do and is more solicitous for their happiness and salvation than we are. God loves everyone individually and passionately and works in ways to ensure that nobody gets lost. Moreover, God is tricky! As good Christian apologists have always pointed out, God has his own schemes, loving traps, and means to lead persons to faith.

Moreover, God is infinitely patient. If we bracket piety for a moment, we might profitably

compare God to a GPS (a *Global Positioning System*) given how infinitely patient and yet persistent a GPS is in giving us directions. A GPS is built with the presumption that it will frequently not be obeyed and that it will have to make the necessary adjustments. We are all familiar with how this works. We are driving towards a destination and the GPS tells us that in order to get there we need to make a right turn at the next intersection. However, we ignore its instruction and drive straight through the intersection. There is a brief silence and then the GPS, taking into account the fact that we ignored its original directive, says, 'recalculating' and gives us a new instruction vis-à-vis getting to our destination. And, it will repeat this cycle endlessly. A GPS, limitless in its patience, keeps 'recalculating', and keeps giving us a new instruction until we get to our destination. It never gives up on us.

God is the same. We have an intended destination and God gives us constant instructions along the way. Religion and the church are an excellent GPS. However, they can be ignored and frequently are. But, God's response is never one of anger nor of a final impatience. Like a trusted GPS, God is forever saying 'recalculating' and giving us new instructions predicated on our failure to accept the previous instruction. Eventually, no matter our number of wrong turns and dead ends, God will get us home.

One last thing. Ultimately, God is the only game in town, in that no matter how many false roads we take and how many good roads we ignore, we all end up on the one, same, last, final road. All of us: atheists, agnostics, nones, dones, searchers, procrastinators, those who don't believe in institutionalized religion, the indifferent, the belligerent, the angry, the bitter, and the wounded, end up on the same road heading towards the same destination – death. However, the good news is that this last road, for all of us, the pious and the impious alike, leads to God.
