Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

During the summer a number of thoughtful quotes have been painted on the auditorium walls. They not only brighten the physical setting but also they will hopefully speak to us as Apostles of Hope. One of them is Ghandi's famous call "to be the change you want to see." I would imagine that like me, your hearts are aching in this dark time in our church. I have discovered a new poverty. I really don't know what to say. All that I can give you is my commitment to Christ Jesus and His to me and to ask the same of you. I was touched by Father Rohlheiser's "Ode to the Church" which is his column this week. I encourage you to read it and to pray with it.

A second quote you'll see in the auditorium is ascribed to St. Francis of Assisi who, as you know, heard the words spoken to us as well today. "Rebuild My Church". Those words of Jesus lead Francis to the words ascribed to him. "The best critique of the bad is the practice of the better". As we endeavor to do both, we pray, where there is darkness let us bring light, where there is injury pardon, despair - hope, sadness - joy.

Throughout the gospel and throughout the beginning of this new season, Jesus calls us to remain open. "*Ephphatha!*" Be open to the possibilities for transformation through selfless love, for recreation that is enabled by humble generosity, for restoration that can be brought about by patient acceptance and understanding. This is what we have been calling "bite-sized" acts of love; the ministry of hope; the response made by Apostles of Hope to the One who continues to call us to read beyond the foreign "*ephphatha*" and to understand the joy brought to self and others by the life-giving response to "be open".

I'm happy to let you know that joining the Pastoral Team in ministry this year is Sister Theresita Donach, csfn. Sister Terry's initials stand for Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth. "Sister T" will be ministering as a part time Pastoral Associate dealing in spirituality, our Baptism and RCIA programs and welcoming new parishioners to SSPJ. I've asked her to write something for next week's bulletin to introduce herself to us. I ask you please to give her your characteristic warm welcome.


A big welcome back to Children's Liturgy! They will begin sharing the word of the Lord with our Pre-k up thru 4th grade children, beginning this weekend.

Reflections on Next Sunday's Scripture Readings

Isaiah 50:4c-9a Psalm 116 James 2:14-18 Mark 8:27-35

The modern believer has many opportunities for Christian discipleship. For example, husbands and wives must share mutual concerns. Parents are constantly challenged to embrace the problems of their children. Citizens and parishioners must involve themselves in the community, both civic and church. All of these arenas provide a gospel-like barometer of our search for personal identity. The real me emerges to the extent that I am involved in the world of concerns. To find oneself is to lose oneself.

The speaker in today's Isaiah passage is described as a disciple open to God's word as the Babylonian exile comes to an end. Unlike his audience, this person trusts in Yahweh. His loyalty to God brings rejection and humiliation. Yet he gives all of himself in order to identify with God's suffering people.

The author of James contrasts living faith and dead faith. He believes that everyday life is the arena for living faith. The acceptance of divine revelation requires an openness to God's world of concerns. To simply wish our brothers or sisters good luck without addressing their real needs is lifeless faith. Faith is the basis of good works; they are not two distinct expressions.

The gospel passage today endorses again Mark's consistent message -- that Jesus is the Messiah. At the same time, this reading prepares us for Jesus' passion and death by showing us that Jesus is a suffering Messiah. Peter cannot accept this qualification of suffering as the road to glory. Thus Peter becomes a prosecuting attorney (a "Satan" or devil's advocate). Mark uses Peter's confusion to teach about Christian discipleship. To be a disciple means to deny oneself and take up the cross. In order to save one's life it is necessary to lose that life.

AN ODE TO THE CHURCH

Carlo Carretto was an Italian monk who died in 1988. For many years he lived as a hermit in the Sahara Desert, translated the scriptures into the Tuareg language, and from the solitude of the desert wrote some extraordinary spiritual books. His writings and his faith were special in that they had a rare capacity to combine an almost childlike piety with (when needed) a blistering iconoclasm. He loved the church deeply, but he wasn't blind to its faults and failures, and he wasn't afraid to point out those shortcomings.

Late in life, when his health forced him to leave the desert he retired to a religious community in his native Italy. While there, late in life, he read a book by an atheist who took Jesus to task for a phrase in the Sermon on the Mount where he says: "Seek and you shall find", meaning, of course, that if you seek God with an honest heart you will find God. The atheist had entitled his book, I Sought and I Didn't Find, arguing from his own experience that an honest heart can seek God and come up empty. Carretto wrote a book in reply called: I Sought and I Found. For him, Jesus' counsel rang true. In his own search, despite encountering many things that could indicate the absence of God, he found God. But he admits the difficulties, and one of those difficulties is, at times, the church. The church can, and sometimes does, through its sin, make it difficult for some to believe in God. Carretto admits this with a disarming honesty but argues that it's not the whole picture.

Hence his book combines his deep love for his faith and his church with his refusal to not turn a blind eye to the very real faults of Christians and the churches. At one point in the book he gives voice to something which might be described as an *Ode to the Church*. It reads this way:

How much I must criticize you, my church and yet how much I love you!

How you have made me suffer much and yet owe much to you.

I should like to see you destroyed and yet I need your presence.

You have given me much scandal and yet you alone have made me understand holiness.

Never in this world have I seen anything more obscurantist, more compromised, more false, and yet never in this world have I touched anything more pure, more generous, and more beautiful.

Many times I have felt like slamming the door of my soul in your face – and yet how often I have prayed that I might die in your sure arms!

No, I cannot be free of you, for I am one with you, even though not completely you.

Then, too – where would I go? To build another church?

But I cannot build another without the same defects, for they are my own defeats I bear within me.

And again, if I build one, it will be my Church, and no longer Christ's.

No, I am old enough to know that I am no better than others.

I shall not leave this Church, founded on so frail a rock, because I should be founding another one on an even frailer rock: myself.

And then, what do rocks matter?

What matters is Christ' promise, what matters is the cement that binds the rocks into one: the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit alone can build the Church with stones as ill-hewn as we.

This is an expression of a mature faith; one which isn't so romantic and idealistic that it needs to be shielded from the darker side of things and one which is real enough so as not to be so cynical that it blinds itself to the evident goodness that also emanates from the church. In truth, the church is both horribly compromised and wonderfully grace-filled. Honest eyes can see both. A mature heart can accept both. Children and novices need to be shielded from the dark underbelly of things; scandalized adults need to have their eyes opened to the evident goodness that's also there.

Many people have left the church because it has scandalized them through its habitual sins, blind spots, defensiveness, self-serving nature, and arrogance. The recent revelations (again) of sexual abuse by priests and the cover-up by church authorities have left many people wondering whether they can ever again trust the church's structure, ministers, and authorities. For many, this scandal seems too huge to digest.

Carlo Carretto's Ode, I believe, can help us all, whether scandalized or pious. To the pious, it can show how one can accept the church despite its sin and how denial of that sin is not what's called for by love and loyalty. To the scandalized, it can be a challenge to not miss the forest for the trees, to not miss seeing that, in the church, frailty and sin, while real, tragic, and scandalous, never eclipse the superabundant life-giving grace of God.
