Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Jesus' outburst in today's Gospel is a little disconcerting - but Jesus' anger is the kind of anger that leads to change and transformation. We've all been angry. We've all had that moment when we've wanted to strike back, shout down, take apart. We've been angered by constant disappointment, continued incompetence, unrelenting criticism.

Here is a brief reflection on anger by Barbara Nilson:

Anger can take two directions. "Bad" anger can lead us into ourselves: we shut ourselves off from whatever makes us angry: walls are set up, bridges are destroyed. Reconciliation is out of the question.

But "good" anger takes us outside of ourselves. Good anger emboldens us to face injustice, to confront wrong, to take on what hurts and diminishes us and others. "Good" anger knows the consequences - but always keeps open a path for reconciliation.

"Bad" anger is an out-of-control conflagration of emotions; "good" anger is controlled, focuses and reasoned.

"Bad" anger can move us to do great harm and evil and sin greater that the cause of anger; "bad" anger seeks punishment and harm for those who hurt us.

But "good" anger cries for healing and making things better again; "good" anger can bring us to resurrection.

In other words, we must not act in anger but act out of anger.

Our parish Lenten mission is here! Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings at 7 pm in Church. Ask anyone who attended the fall sessions with Doctor Tom Petriano – you are sure to be richly blessed as we both deepen our Lenten journey and further our Eucharistic revival. Please be sure to read a little further on in the bulletin, a description and what you are asked to bring with you each of the evenings.

Prayer opportunities during Lent continue this week. Perhaps you might participate in Mass one weekday, or come to Stations of the Cross on Friday. Try taking some time at home to read the Bible, or pray the rosary, or prepare for Reconciliation. Lent offers us many invitations. Let's respond.

And finally,

All of my childhood punishments have become my adult goals: eating vegetables, staying home, having a nap, going to bed early.

When older people say, "Enjoy them while you're young" they're talking about your knees and hips, not your kids.

Don't trust everything you see. Even salt looks like sugar.



Lent and the Eucharist - A Love Beyond All Telling

Looking for something to do this Lent? Consider joining us for three evenings of reflection on Jesus' words at the Last Supper, "Do this in Memory of Me." During these three evenings, March 4, 5, and 6 - at 7 pm in the church. We will explore, through prayer, ritual, and reflection, the meaning of these words that Jesus left us. The Passover meal, the bread that becomes his body, the wine that becomes his blood, the water and the basin used to wash the disciples' feet, and Jesus' death on the cross are his great gift to us and reminders of a love beyond all telling. We hope you can join us for any or all of these evenings as we seek to deepen our understanding of this great mystery of faith. ~ Tom Petriano




We encourage you to fully open yourself to receive the gift of Christ as Real Presence in the Eucharist by participating as much as you feel comfortable with during these three evenings. Each evening will be filled with music, prayer, a presentation by **Tom Petriano**, reflection, and gestures.

On Monday we are inviting you to reflect on what weighs you down. What heavy burden do you carry?

What keeps you from receiving Christ as real presence?

Write that word or phrase (anger, envy, resentment, bitterness, etc.) on a stone and drop that stone at the foot of the cross (set up in the church lobby) turning stones into bread. We will then have the opportunity to break bread and offer hope and vision for receiving Christ as real presence and becoming Eucharist for each other.





On Tuesday we will offer Taizé - Ignatian Prayer of Imagination. we ask you to bring a candle (votive in a receptacle, a Mason jar, battery operated, etc.) You will be invited to carry your light and place it around the cross during the evening. An evening of Prayer, silent meditation, reflection and song.

On Wednesday we invite you to deposit into a basket your written prayer, personal offering to bless and received others as Christ. There will be opportunity to see Christ reflected in yourself and in each other and to bless the hands that serve. Christ has no body but yours.



Fifth Station - Simon of Cyrene Helps Jesus Carry the Cross

As they led Him away, they took hold of a certain Simon, a Cyrenian, who was coming in from the country; and after laying the cross on him, they made him carry it behind Jesus.

As disciples of Jesus, we too follow behind Him helping to carry the crosses of others. The climate crisis impacts us all. Those who do not have the resources to adapt to or defend against the impacts of climate change bear the heaviest crosses. Heat waves, droughts, storms and the resulting economic hardship fall most heavily on Them. Often these events force them to migrate from their homelands to other countries.



As with Simon, the duty to help sometimes feels placed upon us – something we did not volunteer for. But as followers of Christ, we have the responsibility to address the injustices of climate change and To help those who are struggling to survive its impacts. "As Saint John Paul the Second taught, 'by Enduring the toil of working union with Christ crucified for us, man in a way collaborates with the Son of God for redemption of humanity."

Sixth Station - Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus

It has been said that we are the last generation who can address climate change before it's too late. The compassion and courage of Veronica inspire us to bold actions to protect God's creation.

In response to Veronica's tender act of wiping His face, Jesus, in a miraculous gesture, left a perfect imprint of His image on her veil – another revelation into who He really was.

As we now rise to this challenge before us, we will grow closer to knowing our Creator. "At the end we will find ourselves

face to face with the infinite beauty of God, and be able to read with admiration and happiness the mystery of the universe..."





Liturgical Minister Training-Spring 2024

The Diocese of Rockville Center will offer training in Spanish and English for those who wish to serve as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and Lectors. No walk-ins permitted, all participants must be registered in advance with a letter from their pastor.

Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion: Part A - This training is required for all those who are beginning as Ministers. This "BASIC" training is required for all Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Those who wish to minister in hospitals, nursing homes and to the homebound are required to attend Part B training in addition to BASIC training. One must attend Part A training prior to Part B training. A Lector Workshop is available for both new and experienced lectors.





Through God's infinite and merciful love, He sent his only beloved Son, Jesus, to Earth to teach us how to love. He sacrificed his Son to suffer and die a cruel death on the cross to save us from eternal death and damnation for our sins and the sins of Adam and Eve. He sent the Holy Spirit to guide us out of darkness and promised that if we believed, we would be rewarded with true happiness in heaven.

What an amazing gift this is! Through our faith and commitment to Jesus, we can be assured that God, who knows everything about us, including our faults and imperfections, loves us and promises us salvation rather than judgment for our failings!

But what is meant by the words "everyone who believes in Him?" The action word "believes" is much more than merely saying, "I accept Jesus as my Lord and Savior." Real belief in Jesus involves turning one's life over to Jesus and His teachings. It means

making Jesus the center of our lives. It's a commitment to surrender one's selfish ways and to love others the way Christ loves.

It is still true today that many people continue to stay in the darkness rather than have their sins exposed in the light. Sometimes it is self-denial and they are afraid to confront their own sins. Other times, they don't want to admit to others that they are struggling. They fear that changing will be too hard. If only they would trust our most gracious and merciful God, who forgives and restores our souls when we offer our lives to Him.



We show belief when we come into the light and see, accept, and live in the truth of Jesus and His teachings. When we are true believers, our works of love will be Christ-like. Those who believe in Christ love Him and want to be like Him. Our good works will be done out of pure love and gratefulness for our God. Our belief – our faith in Christ – will go hand in hand with our actions – our works – to save us, and we will reach out to bring the Good News to others, too.

Reflect & Discuss:

- + How do you live your life in a way that others can see that you believe God loves you and He loves them, too?
- In what areas of your life must you continue trusting in the love and light of Christ to transform you out of darkness?
- + How can you clearly and simply communicate the Gospel message of God's saving grace through Jesus to others?
- + How can you sincerely share your testimony to show your personal need for a Savior?

REINDEER GAMES

I hate crowds, at least most of them. I'm okay at football games, where a crowd has bracketed its sanity for a couple of hours for a cathartic release. But I hate those crowds that are caught up in a fever that feeds off group think, be that a cultural fad, a political ideology, a religious fundamentalism, an unconscious racism, a misguided nationalism, or hype of any kind. I fear such a crowd because, irrespective of whether its voice is coming from the right or from the left, conservative or liberal, one hears in it echoes of intimidation, crucifixions, lynchings, holocausts, assassinations, wars, suppression of other voices, and (today) teenage suicides from cyber bullying. Crowds take various modalities, but their bent and their energy are invariably the same.

One of my favorite authors is Czeck novelist Milan Kundera who, like me, hates crowds. In them, he sees something he calls "the great march", namely, a blind, mindless march toward a totalitarianism of some kind or other. Crowds with an ideological intent always end up there.

But this raises a question: What about crowds (marches, demonstrations, strikes, sit-ins) that have led to helpful social, political, and even moral change? What about the crowds Gandhi inspired? What about the crowds that followed Martin Luther King? What about the crowds that helped end apartheid in South Africa? What about the crowds that gather around *Black Lives Matter*? What about the folks that gather round a just cause and go to prison for their actions? Aren't those good crowds?

Yes, they are, but they are good precisely to the extent to which they are mindful and not mindless; that is, they are good to the extent that they are not caught up in a fever of group-think and their focus is on healing a sick situation as opposed to hating and crucifying whatever opposes them. That is why in such a crowd, both in its leader and in its overall ethos, you don't see hatred and violence.

Admittedly, you do see hatred and violence even within these crowds because a crowd by the very fact that it is a crowd will invariably have its rogue elements. But the hatred, violence, and anarchy you see then is not representative of that overall crowd. The Gandhis, the Martin Luther Kings, the Nelson Mandelas, and the Dorothy Days are the real face and ethos of any crowd which is genuinely bent on moral change.

But not all crowds are mindful and so it's hardly a surprise that Jesus' crucifixion was incited by a crowd (ironically by the same one who just five days earlier was chanting that he should be their king). Crowd energy is fickle and mindless. That is why crowds are to be feared, irrespective of whether they are idolizing you or hollering for your crucifixion.

I'm not much of a poet, but sometimes something just lends itself to a different kind of language. So, stealing some lines from an old (mindless) Christmas song and adding my own little commentary, allow me to express my feelings about crowds in an attempt at a poem – which in good conscience you may disagree with.

Reindeer Games

Rudolph, the red nosed reindeer

Had a very shiny nose

And if you ever saw it

You would even say it glows.

All of the other reindeer

Used to laugh and call him names.

They never let poor Rudolph

Join in any reindeer games.

Then one foggy Christmas eve

Santa came to say:

Rudolph with your nose so bright

Won't you guide my sleigh tonight?

Then all the other reindeer loved him

As they shouted out with glee ...

Rudolph smiled ...

and then

To see this affection
