Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Today, the fourth Sunday of Lent, traditionally was known as Laetare Sunday. Laetare is Latin for "joy". In a season of fasting, prayer and abstinence, it's easy to forget that one of the liturgical prayers we pray at Mass thanks God, saying, "each year you give us this joyful season." The Lenten season recalls the fact that God chooses to restore, heal, forgive, raise up and save rather than what we might expect: punish for sin. God's plan which we hear today is "that the world might be saved through Christ." All of Lent then, is not about our making up for the sins of the past (they are forgiven), nor trying to persuade God to love us (we are loved beyond all telling), but Lent is a joyful preparation to celebrate and take in the freedom Christ has won for us. "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not from you; it is the gift of God."

Today's gospel speaks of the light. Fr. John Foley, SJ, offers this reflection and poem:

At the end of the Gospel there is a very interesting, wise saying that sums up the message of this week's Lenten readings:

Light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed.

Maybe these sentences reveal the heart of sin itself. Light displays too much of our life. We become ashamed. We hide ourselves. Yet we are built to seek the light....

Once there was a city built in the sunlight. Warmth and laughter abounded. Memories of day would remain every night until the sun could return.

Fear one morning said light is too bright. Too much truth can be seen. How can we seem what we say we are if light the intruder is here?

So walls went up and a ban on all windows and nothing of day could remain. The city said, you have left us, O sun. In the darkness we have gone blind.

But the sun outside still shed its light, and its warmth and its laughter and love. It lightened the walls and gave warmth to their chill, while within, the soul bored a hole.

Into it poured a single beam, a sunlight of laughter and care. Softly, silently, almost like spring, love opened and blossomed and grew.

Listen to the light. Listen to God this Lent. Let love open and blossom and grow.



Seventh Station: Jesus Falls the Second Time

Just as Jesus fell from the weight of the Cross and His own exhaustion, we fall into apathy and discouragement and fail in our commitments.

Calvary was a difficult path for Jesus to climb. He stumbled; He fell. We, too, feel like sometimes we can go no further, that our efforts are in vain.

Some people do not want to hear of the urgency of the climate crisis.

Others place profits ahead of compassion. National and international efforts are weak. Fossil fuel usage increases. Forests and whole towns burn. Storms rage. But "God, who calls us to generous commitment and to give Him our all, offers us the light and the strength to continue on our way... The Lord of Life who loves us so much, is always present. He does not abandon us...for He has united Himself definitively to our earth, and His love constantly impels us to find new ways forward."

EIGHTH STATION

Eighth Station: Jesus Meets the Women of Jerusalem

A large crowd of people followed Jesus, including many women who mourned and lamented Him. Jeus turned to them and said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me; weep instead for yourselves and for your children, for indeed, the days are coming when people will say, 'Blessed are the barren, the wombs that never bore and the breasts that never nursed.'

Today we mourn the destruction caused by the climate crisis and are deeply concerned about the future of the earth that our children and their children will in inherit.

If we don't drastically reduce pour greenhouse gases within the lifetimes of our own children, coastal cities will be flooded, temperatures over 100 will be common. powerful hurricanes will be more frequent, and conflicts caused by food and water scarcity will occur in many parts of the world.

What kind od world do we want to leave those who come after us, to children who are now growing up?...It is no longer enough ...simply to state that we should be concerned for future generations...

Leaving a habitable planet is first and foremost up to us."


THE THREE SCRUTINIES

The Diocese of Rockville Center will offer training in Spanish and English for those who wish to serve as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and Lectors. No walk-ins permitted, all participants must be registered in advance with a letter from their pastor.

Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion: Part A - This training is required for all those who are beginning as Ministers. This "BASIC" training is required for all Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Those who wish to minister in hospitals, nursing homes and to the homebound are required to attend Part B training in addition to BASIC training. One must attend Part A training prior to Part B training. A Lector Workshop is available for both new and experienced lectors.



Saturday, March 23 Ez 37:21-28 Jer 31:10-12d,13 Jn 11:45-56 To be a Christian is to follow Christ, be like Christ, serve as Christ, love as Christ, suffer and die as Christ, and ultimately rise as Christ. During his public ministry, Jesus told his disciples from the start that anyone who wished to be a follower of his must renounce himself and take up his cross every day to follow him.

As "his hour" drew nearer and the Holy Will of his Heavenly Father was just around the corner, Jesus once again told his disciples in no uncertain terms that to follow him would mean to take up their own crosses and be willing to suffer and die for the love of others. Jesus challenged his disciples to live lives of selfless service to others then, and his challenge continues for us now.

What a beautiful image Jesus gave us of the grain of wheat! According to the Catechism, "The grain of wheat points to the Holy Eucharist in which the Sacrifice of Christ becomes really present. As we die to ourselves in union with him, especially in the Sacrament of the Eucharist, we

become other christs." (CCC 2731)

As we submit our hearts to the Lord and give our lives as disciples of Christ, every one of us is called in many ways to share in the joys and sorrows of Christ. Just as at different seasons of our lives we are given different crosses to bear, we are also called to different ways to serve others. When we serve others, Christ works in us and through us. We can be Jesus to those he puts in our paths to help.



We can see Jesus in those we serve.

Sometimes it is easier than other times, but we must remember that Jesus is reflected in us when we are serving. Sometimes God uses our acts of faith and charity to break open seeds in other souls as well.

- What has had to die in your life for you to draw closer to Christ?
- † Thinking of a cross you have carried in the past, how has your faith grown since it has lifted?
- † What is the heaviest cross you are being asked to bear right now?

AGING AS A NATURAL MONASTERY

What is a monastery? How do monasteries work? Saint Benedict (480-547 AD), who is considered the founder of Western monasticism, offered this counsel as an essential rule for his monks: *Stay in your cell and it will teach all you need to know.* Properly understood, this is a rich metaphor, not a literal counsel. When he is telling a monk to stay in his cell and let it teach him what he needs to know, he is not referring to a literal monk's cell in a monastery. He is referring to the state of life in which a monk or anyone else finds himself or herself.

Sometimes this has been expressed in Christian spirituality as being faithful to *your duties of state. T*he idea here being that if you are faithful in love and in good heart to the situation in life in which you find yourself, life itself will bring you to maturity and virtue. For example, a mother who gives herself over in selflessness and fidelity to raising her children will be brought to maturity and altruism through that process. Her home will be her monk's cell and she will be metaphorically the Abbess of the monastery (with some very young monks) and staying inside that monastery, her home, will teach her all she needs to know. She will be raising children, but they will also be raising her. Motherhood will teach her what she needs to know and will turn her into a wise elder, a biblical and archetypal Sophia.

The process of aging is a natural monastery. If we live long enough, eventually the aging process turns everyone into a monk. Monks take four vows: poverty, chastity, obedience, and perseverance. The process of aging, which moves us (seemingly without mercy) toward marginalization, dependence on others, away from an active sex life, and into a living situation from which there will be no escape, in a manner of speaking, imposes those four vows on us. But, as Saint Benedict counsels, this can teach us all we need to know, and has a unique power to mature us in a very deep way. Monks have secrets worth knowing. So does the aging process.

This can be particularly instructive vis-à-vis how we can make our final days and our death a more radical gift to others. In the first centuries of Christianity, martyrdom was seen as the ideal way for a Christian to end his or her days here on earth. It was seen as a radical way of imitating Christ and giving your death away as a gift. Of course, this had to be rethought after Christianity became the state religion and emperors no longer martyred Christians. What followed then were various attempts at doing this, metaphorically martyrdom. One fairly popular way of doing it was that, after raising their children and reaching retirement, a couple would leave each other and each would go off to a separate monastery and live out the rest of his or her life as a monk or a nun.

Classical Christian mystics speak about how in the last phase of our lives we should enter something they call the *dark night of the spirit*, namely, that we proactively make a radical decision grounded in faith to move into a situation in life where we can no longer take care of ourselves but must trust, in raw faith, that God will provide for us. This parallels Hindu spirituality which suggests that in the last, fully mature stage of life we should become a *sannyasin*, a holy old beggar.

I suspect that most of us will never proactively cut off all our former securities and, on purpose, place ourselves in a situation within which we are helpless to provide for and take care of ourselves. But this is where nature steps in. The aging process will do it for us. It will turn us into a *sannyasin* and put us into the *dark night of the spirit*.

How? As we age and our health declines and we find ourselves more marginalized in terms of having a vital place within society, we will progressively lose our capacity to take care of ourselves. Eventually, if we live long enough, for most of us it will mean moving into an assisted facility, which is in effect a natural monastery.

What an apt metaphor! An assisted living facility as a natural monastery. The metaphor is also apropos for what it means to (by conscription) enter the *dark night of the spirit* and what it means to be a holy old beggar, a *sannyasin*. In essence it means this: When someone is in an assisted living facility, irrespective of whether he or she is a millionaire or a pauper, the rules are the same for everyone. Since you can no longer take care of yourself (and indeed you don't have to) you live a monastic life of obedience and dependence.

In assisted living, you live by the monastic bell and you die as a holy old beggar.
