Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Here we are again in "ordinary time". We have packed away the Christmas decorations for another year. But hopefully we haven't packed away the spirit and promise and reality of Christmas. We celebrated the coming of Emmanuel - of God with us. Now we strive to live the Christmas miracle throughout the year, for Jesus remains with us - encouraging us, guiding us, and inviting us to keep the light of Christmas burning in our hearts and in our actions.

An interesting question is raised in today's gospel as we begin ordinary time: "what are you looking for?" Many of us are looking to grow in our faith, to deepen our relationship with Jesus. Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP, notes:

The Gospel tells us about seekers who discovering a deeper call. The people in today's story already are people looking for God. John the Baptist is a mentor to his disciples, and he points them to another who will be their teacher ("Rabbi"). John uses a favorite image for Jesus, "Lamb of God." It is rich in many biblical meanings, and the commentators warn us not to settle on just one.

But we too have had our titles, our names for Jesus. How do we know these titles are still valid for us? Haven't we changed, haven't our lives grown? Who is Jesus for us now and how do we call upon him? We, like the disciples of John, are being invited to follow Jesus at this time in our lives, to spend time with him and to discover who he is for us now. Like the two disciples we are seekers who want to "stay" with Jesus.

As today's seekers, still looking to stay with Jesus, how do we proceed? Perhaps we might take a clue from today's first reading, for as Eli instructed Samuel, we too make time to say, *Speak, Lord, your servant is listening*. This does mean that we will actually allow God to speak to our hearts - that we will make some time to be still and listen. It's a challenge in today's hectic world. Are you and I up for the challenge? As Apostles of Hope, we support one another in service, in prayer, and *in listening*.

To the 8th grade Confirmation Candidates who made retreat last Saturday – two pieces of good news: first, you were considered exceptional by those who conducted the retreat – respectful, engaged, and ready! Please use these remaining months before Confirmation to listen to the Lord who calls you as Samuel was called in today's first ready. Like him, be open and say, "speak Lord, I'm listening".

Second, we have a **new Youth Minister** who is looking forward to meeting you, listening to you and deepening with you a response to our God who desires to help you "become the best version of yourself". Her name is **Ms. Sandy Rago**. She's also a teacher in SSPJ School, has a background in school social work as well as her ministry as teacher and faithfilled disciple. I am delighted to welcome her and grateful for her "yes". All of us will have the opportunity to meet her as she introduces herself to us at Mass very soon.

The Pastoral Council is very excited about our upcoming Dine Around set for February 5th. Ticket sales begin this weekend. Many of our local eateries have joined in. Check out the flier and be sure to thank them. Tickets are \$25 and are limited to the first 200 purchasers. No tickets will be sold at the door. Plan on a delightful, delicious, downright great evening! I look forward to seeing you there.

This week we remember the birthday of Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., a powerful advocate for racial justice and non-violence. Unfortunately, racism and violence are still powerful forces of evil in our world. We each have the responsibility to pray for and to work for an end to racism and violence. We ask our loving Savior, brother to all and guide to non-violence, to open minds and hearts - including our own - to live as He taught and teaches us.

Next weekend is Word of God Sunday. All are invited to bring their Bible to Mass as we ask God's blessing, that God's Word in Scripture will touch our hearts and guide our lives.

And finally,





Please make sure your Positive Attitude and Gratitude are secured and locked in the upright position.



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

Saturday, January 27 2 Sm 12:1-7a,10-17 Ps 51:12-17 Mk 4:35-41 Today's Gospel reading is a call to surrender ourselves fully to God. "Now is the time of fulfillment" – not just 2,000 years ago, not at the Second Coming of Christ, but right now in your life when and where you need Jesus the most.

"The kingdom of God is at hand" – what you need from the Lord is right here, at hand, ready for you.

"Repent, and believe in the gospel" means "Come follow Me and learn from Me to become like Me." For the first disciples, it meant dropping whatever they were doing to spend so much time with Jesus that their whole lives were forever affected.

And this is what it means for you and for me: We have to put aside our own agendas and overly busy schedules to spend more time following Jesus wherever he leads us.

In the modern world, we have become more dependent on our technological devises than on Jesus. Many of us cannot even go on vacation without remaining accessible to their employers via the cell phone. Somehow, we need to find a way to take a stand against this.

It's one of the social justice teachings of the Church: We are actually called by God to rebel against working on Sundays and other days of rest. Why? Because we need to spend that time with Jesus quietly being restored and re-energized.



Unfortunately, Jesus doesn't walk through the door and circle dates on our calendar and write "Rest with Jesus" on it so that we can plan ahead. We have to follow his lead at a moment's notice – every moment. To experience the kingdom of God on the earthly side of heaven, we have to be willing to drop everything to follow Jesus into unfamiliar places at unexpected times. We have to learn to follow his lead even in situations where his way is the surprising way.

Reflect & Discuss:

- † What's on your to-do list? What keeps you busy? What are your goals for the future? What are you dreaming of?
- † If Jesus has a different plan for your day or for your life, how easily could you switch over to new ideas and plans?
- † What are some of the nets you've abandoned in the past in order to follow Jesus? How difficult was that to do?
- † Are you happy about it now? Why? How was this an experience of the kingdom of God on earth?

PIETY AND HUMOR

Piety is the enemy of humor, at least whenever something less than piety is masquerading as piety. Here's an example: I once lived in community with an overly serious man who, after someone would tell a colorful joke, would bring us back to earth with the question, "Would you tell a joke like that in front of the Blessed Sacrament?" That not only deflated the joke and its teller, but it also took the oxygen out of the room.

There's a response I would have liked to have given to his question, namely, a joke my Oblate Novice Master used to tell, one whose irony exposes false piety. The joke runs this way: A young woman was getting married and her family could not afford a venue for a reception for the wedding. The parish priest generously offered them the foyer at the entrance of the church, telling them they could bring in a cake and have a reception there. The father of the bride asked whether they might also bring in some liquor. "Absolutely not," the priest replied, "you can't drink liquor in a church!" "But," protested the bride's father, "Jesus drank wine at the wedding feast of Cana." "But not in front of the Blessed Sacrament!" replied the priest.

Admittedly, humor can be impious, crass, offensive, dirty, but whenever that's the case the fault normally lies more in the aesthetics than in the content of the joke. A joke isn't offensive because it is about sex or religion or any other area we surround with sacredness. Humor is offensive when it crosses a line in terms of respect, taste, and aesthetics. Humor is offensive when it is bad art. Bad art crosses a line in terms of respect, either vis-à-vis its audience or its subject matter. What can make a joke offensive or dirty is when it is told, or how it is told, or to whom it is told, or the tone in which it is told, or lack of sensitivity to what is being told, or the color of the language as it is being told. Whether or not it can be told before the blessed sacrament isn't a criterion. If a joke shouldn't be told in front of the blessed sacrament it shouldn't be told in front of anyone. There aren't two standards of offensiveness.

Still, bad piety is the enemy of humor. It's also the enemy of robust, earthy living. But that is only the case for bad piety, not genuine piety. Genuine piety is one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit and is a healthy reverence before all of life. But it's a reverence that, while healthily respectful, is not offended by humor (even robust, earthy humor) providing the humor isn't aesthetically offensive – akin to nudity which is healthy in art but offensive in pornography.

False sensitivity that masks itself as piety also strips all spirituality of humor, save for the most pious kind. In doing that, in effect, it makes Jesus, Mary, and the saints humorless, and thus less than fully human and healthy. One of our mentors at our Oblate novitiate told us, young novices, that there is not a single incident reported in scripture of Jesus ever laughing. He told us this to dampen our natural, youthful, rambunctious energy, as if this was somehow a hinderance to being religious.

Humorous energy is not a hindrance to being religious. To the contrary. Jesus is the paragon of all that is healthily human, and he, no doubt, was a fully healthy, robust, delightful human person, and none of those words (healthy, robust, delightful) would apply to him if he hadn't had a healthy, indeed earthy, sense of humor

For fifteen years I taught a course entitled *The Theology of God* to seminarians and others preparing for ministry. I would try to cover all the required basis asked for in the curriculum – biblical revelation, patristic insights, normative church teachings, and speculative views from contemporary theologians. But, inside all of this, like a recurring theme in an opera, I would tell the students this: In all your preaching and teaching and pastoral practices, whatever else, *try not to make God look stupid*. Try not to make God look unintelligent, tribal, petty, rigid, nationalistic, angry, or fearful. Every homily, every theological teaching, every ecclesial practice, and every pastoral practice ultimately reflects an image of God whether we want it to or not. And if there is something less than healthy in our preaching or pastoral practices, the God who underwrites it will also appear as unhealthy. A healthy God does not undergird an unhealthy theology, ecclesiology, or anthropology.

Hence, if we teach a Jesus who is humorless, who takes offense at the earthiness of life, who is uncomfortable hearing the word sex, who flinches at colorful language, and who is afraid to smile and chuckle at irony, wit, and humor, we make Jesus appear as rigid and uptight, a prude, and not the person you want to be beside at table.
