Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Jesus said to his disciples: "I tell you, unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven.

Strong words from Jesus! While we often glean somewhat negative descriptions of the scribes and Pharisees, it's true that many if not most were good, faithful people, trying to follow the way of God. Don't we try to do that too? But, like some of the scribes and Pharisees, might we get caught up in rigidity and miss out on the true, loving message of God? Might we be neglectful of the wisdom of Jesus? Fr. Larry Gillick, SJ, reflects:

We here in the United States love the exactness of laws so we know what's right and how we can get around or through or under or above what's written. God so loved the world that God sent a Relational Person to share the sacredness of our lives and the sacredness of God's relationship with us. The Wisdom of Jesus is not "how" he lived, but the "why." He came and continues coming, respectful of our freedom, to encourage us to reverence our lives, the time we have and the lives and times we have with others.

Lent begins on Wednesday, February 22nd, Ash Wednesday. Last week I wrote about the upcoming renovation involving our Baptismal font - the moving of the present one and the location of the new one designed for our parish. This new font will be by the stained-glass window portraying the Baptism of the Lord and the present font will be in our gathering area, so all can bless themselves while remembering those who have gone before us. I also suggested that this physical renovation process can connect with our spiritual renovation process as we journey through the season of Lent. And I said I'd explain more about our Lenten theme, *Take off your shoes.* To do this, I'd ask you to consider and hopefully accept an invitation.

An Invitation to a Pilgrimage - So Take Off Your Shoes!

The invitation comes from Jesus – *Follow me!* There are many ways we can respond to that invite. One is to make a pilgrimage – a journey to a sacred place. There are many sacred places – and sacred spaces. But "take off your shoes"?? On a pilgrimage wouldn't it make more sense to put on sturdy, protective shoes for the possibly rugged road ahead? What is Jesus up to?

Remember the story in Scripture of Moses and the burning bush? (Exodus 3:1-5) Moses was busy about his ordinary life, tending his flock, when he noticed a bush on fire. But the bush did not burn up! Then he hears God tell him to remove his sandals for he is standing on holy ground. Can you just imagine Moses being stunned and then looking down at the ground where he is standing, responding with amazement, "But this is the ground I always stand on!" Then God replies, "Yes, I know!"

Might that have happened? Might that be happening today in each of our lives? How often might Moses have passed that same bush without ever noticing it? How often do we go about our daily lives, not really noticing what's around us? How might we come to recognize more deeply that we are standing on holy ground? How might we experience more fully being surrounded by the holy presence of God? How might we allow that real presence of God around and within us to affect how we live? Could a type of pilgrimage move us along?

Father Tom's Letter continued

This Lent all in our parish are invited on a *Lenten Pilgrimage* as we explore the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. Included along the way will be reflections on our baptismal fonts, old and new, and our connections to each. We'll also reflect on how Confirmation strengthens our Baptismal commitment and how Eucharist nourishes our experience of God's Real Presence around and within us. Part of this pilgrimage will be a Lenten Retreat with Fr. Adam MacDonald, SVD (Divine Word Missionary). There will also be stops along the way offering varied prayer experiences and opportunities to serve. This journey through sacred time and sacred space to a sacred place culminates in our celebration of Easter – all fifty days of it!

Will you be part of this Pilgrimage? Will you "take off your shoes"? On Ash Wednesday, each of us will be offered a Lenten bracelet saying, *Take off your shoes*. Will you accept that invitation? Taking off our shoes leaves us more vulnerable, but that vulnerability gives God more opportunity to touch our lives more deeply.

St. Thomas More said, there was never a pilgrim who did not come back to their village with one less prejudice and one more idea.

Please, be a pilgrim with us this Lent. Take off your shoes!

As the process begins for the placement of the new Baptismal Font with the removal of five pews (remember, these pews will be relocated to other parts of the church) I ask you to begin thinking about your own Baptism. Most of us were baptized as infants and so any "memories" are dependent on recollections of those who were present. But each of us was given a name at Baptism. Who gave you your name? Why were you given that name? Who were your godparents? Where were you baptized? Do you know the date of your Baptism? If not, might you find out?

In the coming weeks, as the new font is created, each of us will be invited to place a remembrance of our Baptism in the base of the font. In the bulletin you will find "A Baptism Remembrance" to cut out and fill in. These will be gathered and placed in the base of the new font as a way of connecting us to one another and to all those who will be baptized in coming years. We are baptized into Christ Jesus, and are sisters and brothers to one another. Please feel free to make more copies as needed - or create your own remembrance! Parents, please help your children to complete their Baptism remembrance. And kids, help your parents and grandparents!

THE SEASON OF LENT:

Time for our "Annual Attitude Adjustment"
Greetings of peace, love, and joy in the name of our
Lord Jesus Christ! My name is Fr. Adam MacDonald,
and I'm a member of the Society of the Divine Word, an
international religious congregation comprised of nearly
6,000 Roman Catholic priests and brothers who make it
our aim to proclaim God's Word and witness God's love
to the peoples of the world. We currently serve in more
than 80 countries across the globe!



A native of Flint, Michigan, I responded to God's call at a young age, entering seminary formation with the Society as a high school graduate. After 12 years of seminary studies in Iowa and Illinois and missionary training experiences in both Japan and the Philippines, I professed First Vows in 1994 and Perpetual Vows in 1999. A few days after my Perpetual Vows, I was ordained a Deacon, and in June, 2000 I was ordained to the priesthood with my first Mission Assignment to the Central Philippines where I served in a large parish in the suburbs of the capital Manila from 2000 to 2002.

In 2003, the Society reassigned me back to the United States, and since that time I have served in various posts of community leadership and administration, Spiritual Direction and retreat ministry, and Vocation Ministry.

The youngest of six children, many are interested to know that I am not the only priest in my family. My brother Timothy is a priest of the Diocese of Lansing, Michigan while my older brother Eben is a priest of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles.

On March 13 – 15, I look forward to the privilege of joining the parish community there at Saints Philip and James in spending some days on retreat, deepening our personal and communal relationship with Jesus and entering more deeply into the beauty and promise of the Lenten season as we prepare our hearts to celebrate the Resurrection of Christ at Easter.

THE SEASON OF LENT:

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As we look more closely at the meaning and purpose of the traditional Lenten disciplines of **Prayer**, **Fasting**, **and Almsgiving**, we will consider how these familiar practices are not just annual acts of sacrifice we make for our self-mortification but rather an invitation to a profound change of heart and attitude which can impact the way we live long after Lent is over.

We enter into the Lenten season this year heeding the call of the Church to a Eucharistic Revival, an opportunity to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. And so our reflections will likewise explore how we can break ourselves open and become the bread of kindness for others!

Come join us for our parish retreat, and let's make this the "Best Lent Ever!"



"To persevere is to remain constant in goodness, especially when the reality around us urges us to do otherwise. Let us reflect on a few examples: I know that prayer is important, but, like everyone, I too always have a lot to do, and so I put it off: "No, I am busy now, I can't, I'll do it later". Or, I see many crafty people who take advantage of situations, who dodge the rules, and so I too stop observing them and persevering in justice and legality: "But if these scoundrels do it, so will I!". Beware of this!

And again: I carry out service in the Church, for the community, for the poor, but I see that many people in their free time think only of enjoying themselves, and so I feel like giving up and do what they do. Because I do not see results, or I get bored, or it does not make me happy.

Persevering, instead, is *remaining* in goodness. Let us ask ourselves: what is my perseverance like? Am I constant, or do I live faith, justice and charity according to the moment: I pray if I feel like it; I am fair, willing and helpful if it suits me; whereas if I am dissatisfied, if no one thanks me, do I stop? In short, do my prayer and service depend on circumstances or on a heart that is steadfast in the Lord? If we persevere — Jesus reminds us — we have nothing to fear, even in the sad and ugly events of life, even in the evil we see around us, because we remain grounded in the good. Dostoevsky wrote: "Have no fear of men's sin. Love a man even in his sin, for that is the semblance of Divine Love and is the highest love on earth" (*The Brothers Karamazov*, Part 2, Book 4, Chapter 3). Perseverance is the reflection in the world of God's love, because God's love is faithful, it is persevering, it never changes.

May Our Lady, servant of the Lord, persevering in prayer (cf. *Acts* 1:12), fortify our perseverance."



Construction of New Baptismal Font~Opportunity to donate to "Baptismal Renovations"

Removal of 5 existing pews and set aside to be repurposed.



Reposition pews in open areas as well as reconstructed to be placed in the sanctuary.

Construct pedestal and base to hold new baptismal font.

Construct custom fitted insert to allow easy cleaning and sanitizing of font in gathering vestibule.



Relocate existing original Baptismal Font from the Old Church to the gathering vestibule.

Construct and install custom fabricated baptismal bowl with drain.



Construct knee wall to define new baptismal area under the stained-glass window depicting the Baptism of Christ

Construct custom shelving to hold bowl and pitcher used during Holy Thursday "washing of the feet"

Relocate existing Chism

cabinet.

Provide new finish to tabernacle and update with coordinating tile as on baptismal font. Supply and install marble base at the foot of the new baptismal font and baptismal font in gathering space.



Ps 86:1-6 Luke 5:27-32 Mercy is the key to understanding this Sunday's Gospel reading. Think of love as the front door to people's hearts. When they close it, mercy is the love that sneaks in through the back door.

In ancient times, if someone gouged another person in the eye, the victim could gather his clan

and punish him by wiping out his aggressor's clan. So God gave his people a law that brought them closer to love: If someone hurts your eye, you may do nothing more than the same to him. It was still unloving, but at least it was fair.

When Jesus came onto the scene, he raised the standards: If someone hurts you, don't play fair; give that person love.

When people sin against us, they don't understand that they're closing their hearts to God and his love. But if we give them love, we give them God through a back door.

This does not mean we are to remain in harm's way. But if we continue to give them love – even if only from afar – we bring God and his healing into the situation.

If someone steals from you or

demands something from you unjustly, you can't stop his greed but you can stop him from sinning against you: Let it go, give it to him. And as an act of generous love, give him more! I know it doesn't feel right, but this is what Jesus says is right. Divinely right.

If someone asks you to do a chore for her because she's lazy, prevent it from becoming a sin of cruelty, gladly do what she asks and volunteer to do more.



This plan of Jesus demonstrates, through us, that God's love is superior to everything else. It proves that love conquers evil.

This is what it means to be perfect. Perfection in the Bible means the fullness of love – complete, unlimited, merciful love.

Reflect & Discuss:

- † Think of a time when God showed you mercy even though you didn't deserve his love. What did it feel like when he gave you his love anyway? How did it change you?
- Who is currently sinning against you? What good deeds can you do simply and easily even before he or she asks for forgiveness?
- Describe a time when you did a good deed to someone who caused you difficulties. What kind of impact did your efforts make? If you're not aware of good results yet, how did it help you experience God's love?
- + How can stopping an abuse be done as an act of love?

OUR OVER-BURDENED PLANET

Creating the human race may be the single biggest mistake that evolution made. Douglas Abrams writes this in *The Book of Hope*, a book he co-authored with Jane Goodall. While that is a rather despairing view, in the end, this book is a book of hope, though not without it issuing a dire warning: There are now over eight billion people on this planet and already we are using up nature's limited resources faster than nature can replace them. In less than thirty years from now, there will probably be ten billion of us and if we carry on with business as usual, that could spell the end of the earth as we know it.

What do we need to do to turn this around? Goodall and Abrams suggest four things:

First, we must alleviate poverty. When people are hungry and desperate, their thoughts are not on the big picture, namely, the long-range future and the overall good of all humans and the planet. Understandably, their thoughts will be focused on survival and there will be no hesitation in cutting down the last tree to grow food or catching that last fish still alive. Desperation and concern for the big picture generally don't go together.

Second, we must reduce the unsustainable lifestyles of the affluent. Mother earth is not a limitless resource and cannot continue indefinitely to sustain our present lifestyles. Moreover, this is true not just for the lavish lifestyles of the rich, but for all of us in most countries. We haven't faced the fact that everything is limited and hence, we continue to buy in excess, consume in excess, use electrical energy in excess, waste food in excess, use gasoline in excess, and create garbage in excess. This cannot continue much longer. Already millions of desperate refugees on borders everywhere and dramatic shifts in climate most everywhere are telling us that we must make changes, and soon. Our planet is big, but it is finite, and it cannot sustain the limitless demands of unexamined consumption.

Third, we must eliminate corruption and economic self-interest. Without good government and honest leadership that focuses on the big picture rather than on its own self-interests, it is impossible to solve our enormous social, economic, and environmental problems. As a Barbara Kingsolver character quips in her recent novel, *Unsheltered*, the free-market has the same morality as a cancer cell. The entrepreneurial spirit that drives our economies serves us well in many ways and affords us comforts, freedoms, and opportunities that few in history have ever had. However, generally it is to the big picture what a cancer cell is to the body, a single cell growing on its own without connection to the overall health of the body. Like a cancer cell, the free-market (with some exceptions) does not take the big picture and the long-range health of the whole body into account.

Fourth, we must face up to the problems caused by an ever-growing population. For most of history, religious and moral voices have literally commanded people to have children. *Increase and multiply.* This was a sacred duty, owed to God and the human race. However, for a large part, this was predicated on fears that the human race, like any species, was perennially in danger of becoming extinct. Indeed, there was the constant threat that his might happen. Diseases, famines, war, high infant mortality, a short life span, and disasters of all kinds constantly threatened the human species. Humans, like every species, needed to ensure that the species went on. That made sense, in every way, until this present century. Now, with the looming prospect of ten billion people on this planet, the threat of extinction arises more from our sheer number than from some external threat. The planet can only accommodate a given number of us at one time. Granted there are soul issues, moral issues, and religious issues involved with any talk of limiting human growth. Nonetheless, however complex these issues, unexamined growth must now be examined.

Abrams is wrong. Creating the human race was not a tragic mistake that evolution made! Creating the human person was not an accidental and undesired product of blind evolution. God is the author of the process of evolution and God doesn't make mistakes. God intended from the very beginning for us, human persons, to emerge from the process. Even more, God intended us to have a very special role in the process, namely, to be that place in the process where nature finally becomes conscious of itself and can then proactively help God shape the process towards a final peace and unity (the Kingdom of God) that will include all of us and the planet itself.

Humans weren't a mistake, though admittedly much of our stewarding has been because we tend to think of the world as something we can strip mine in any way that benefits us rather than as a garden, with limited resources, which we have been asked to care for with love.
