Sacraments

Baptism— Celebrated twice per month. Parents are asked to register at the Pastoral Center for Pre-Baptism Program.

Marriage—Couples are asked to contact the Pastoral Center before visiting the reception hall. The Marriage Preparation process is nine months before your proposed wedding date.

Confirmation—Seventh and Eighth grade students are prepared to celebrate through Religious Ed or SSPJ School. Adults prepare through RCIA.

Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

In today's readings we go from a burning bush to a barren fig tree! In the first reading, Moses is attracted to flaming fire coming from a bush. Yet, the bush is not consumed by the fire! The fig tree, which after three years is expected to bear fruit, yields nothing. What's going on?

Fr. John Foley, SJ, reflects that these readings reveal the mercy, the hopes, and the encouragement of our loving God.

From the burning bush, God begins to instruct Moses about how to rescue God's people. Great compassion from the depths of the transcendent God....

An orchard owner orders his gardener to chop down a sadly unproductive fig tree. The gardener advises him to leave it one more year and see if, with some tending, it will bear fruit. Give it one more chance.

Who does the heartless orchard owner represent? We always assume that it is God. But, on the contrary, Jesus is not the orchard owner but the gardener, asking mercy for the disobedient fig tree.

There is still reason to fear God, of course, since he is infinite and infinitely more fiery than the burning bush. But the closer you come to the real center of God, the more your fear turns to gratitude. You are not scalded or consumed by the divine fire—you are warmed and gentled at its welcoming hearth. Jesus' tough love leads us to that hearth.

As our Lenten journey continues, pause for a moment and consider - Are you drawing ever closer to the warmth of God through prayer, fasting and almsgiving? Are you allowing the tender Gardener to tend to you, bringing forth love, mercy and hope? Are you saying, "Yes, my Lord!"? We still have some weeks to go. Let's use them well. I wish to thank all of the wonderful "Apostles of Hope" that assisted in distributing our Lenten bracelets during masses last weekend. So grateful to each and everyone of you who responded "Yes, my Lord!".

Again, thanks to those who have already helped us approach our Catholic Ministries Appeal goal. As you know, our response provides support for so many of the good works happening on Long Island and our hoped for rebate upon reaching our goal is targeted for the upgrade to the church sound system which we hope to have completed for our Easter celebration. If you haven't already done so and are able, please consider a pledge or donation.

As mentioned last weekend by Sister Theresita, please remember those preparing for Baptism and full reception into the Church at the Easter Vigil. During these weeks of Lent their preparation intensifies. We pray for and with them and the members of the RCIA Team who are journeying with them.

I invite you to join me on Sunday, April 28th, at the 12noon Mass as I pray in thanksgiving for all of you and for the many, many people who have shown me the face of God over these past 40 years of priesthood. A simple coffee and cake gathering will follow in the auditorium

And, since spring returned this past week....

*What season is it when you are on a trampoline?
Spring-time!*

*What flowers grow on faces?
Tulips (Two-lips)!*

*Why are trees very forgiving?
Because in the Fall they "Let It Go" and in the Spring they "turn over a new leaf".*

And finally (I promise!)








Music Ministry





Lenten Regulations 2019

Traditionally, the Lenten Season is a time of penance throughout the Catholic Church.

Lent is a season in which prayer, the reception of the sacraments, charity and almsgiving are emphasized. Fast and abstinence are to be observed Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday:

These are days of *Fast and Abstinence from meat*. There is a limit of one full meal on these days for all between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive.

Days of Abstinence: (All Fridays in Lent):

All who have reached their 14th year are bound to abstain totally from meat.



Join the Party

This Week's Readings at Mass

- Joshua 5:9a, 10-12 - Rites at Gilgal
- 2 Corinthians 5:17-21 - A new creation
- Luke 15:1-3, 11-32 - The prodigal son

Upon hearing the famous story of the Prodigal Son, we may instantly feel a connection with one son or the other. Maybe we have strayed in our lives—or even intentionally walked away from friends, family, and home—and have been welcomed back despite feeling we didn't deserve to be. Or perhaps we feel like the older son who has been working his tail off to do what he thinks is expected of him and then feels resentful when his wayward brother gets welcomed home. What if instead of focusing on one or the other sons, we focus on the father's response to both of them in the parable?

The father has generosity and joy enough for both sons. He wants *both* at the party—not just the sinner or the do-gooder. He throws the party so the younger son knows he is welcomed home wholeheartedly, *and* he tells the older son “everything I have is yours.” In that society, what the father possessed did not belong to the sons until he died; they had no claim on it until after his death. So it is highly unusual for the father to give the younger son his part of the inheritance prematurely, and *just* as unusual for the father to tell the older son “It's already yours.” The father wants to share all he has and celebrate his relationship with both sons equally. It's not about favorites; it's an invitation for everyone to join the party. Tax collectors and sinners were

joining Jesus “at the party.” Will the Pharisees and scribes too?

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Our Struggle for Proper Celebration

We don't know how to celebrate things as they're meant to be celebrated. We want to, but mostly we don't know how. Generally we celebrate badly. How do we normally celebrate? By overdoing things; by taking a lot of the things we ordinarily do, drinking, eating, talking, singing, and humoring, and bringing them to excess. For most of us, celebration means eating too much, drinking too much, singing too loudly, telling one joke too many, and hoping that somewhere in all that excess we will find the secret to make this occasion extraordinary.

We have this odd idea that we can find special joy and delight by pushing things beyond their normal limits. But there's precious little real delight in this. Heightened enjoyment is found in connecting with others more deeply, in feeling our lives expanded, and in experiencing love and playfulness in a special way. But that doesn't happen in a frenzy. Hence our celebrations are mostly followed by a hangover, physical and emotional. Why? Why is genuine celebration so hard to do?

Perhaps the main reason is that we struggle congenitally to simply enjoy things, to simply take life, pleasure, love, and enjoyment as gracious and free gifts from God, pure and simple. It's not that we lack this capacity for this. God has given us this gift. More at issue is the fact that our capacity to enjoy is often mixed with inchoate feelings of guilt about experiencing pleasure (and the greater the pleasure, the deeper our feeling of guilt.) Among other things, because of this, we often struggle to enjoy what's legitimately given us by God because, consciously or unconsciously, we feel that our experience of pleasure is somehow "stealing from God." This is an uneasiness that particularly afflicts sensitive and moral souls. Somehow, in the name of God, we struggle to give ourselves full permission to enjoy, and this leaves us prone to excess (which is invariably a substitute for genuine enjoyment).

Whatever the reasons, we struggle with this and thus many of us go through life deprived of a healthy capacity to enjoy and, since nature will still have its way, we end up alternating between rebellious enjoyment ("pleasure we steal from God", but feel guilty about) and dutiful discipline (which we do without a lot of delight). But we're rarely able to genuinely celebrate. We rarely find the genuine delight we are looking for in life and this pushes us into pseudo-celebration, namely, excess. Put simply, because we struggle to give ourselves permission to enjoy, ironically we tend to pursue enjoyment too much and often not in the right ways. We confuse pleasure with delight, excess with ecstasy, and the obliteration of consciousness with heightened awareness. Because we cannot simply enjoy, we go to excess, burst our normal limits, and hope that obliterating our awareness will heighten it.

And yet, celebrate we must. We have an innate need to celebrate because certain moments and events of our lives (e.g., a birthday, a wedding, a graduation, a commitment, an achievement, or even a funeral) simply demand it. They demand to be surrounded with rituals which heighten and intensify their meaning and they demand that they be shared in a special, highlighted way with others. What we cease to celebrate we will soon cease to cherish.

The same is true of some of our deeper loving, playful, and creative moments. They too demand to be celebrated: highlighted, widened, and shared with others. We have an irrepressible need to celebrate, that's good. Indeed the need for ecstasy is hardwired into our very DNA. But ecstasy is heightened awareness, not obliterated consciousness. Celebration is meant to intensify our awareness, not deaden it. The object of celebration is to highlight certain events and feelings so as to share them with others in an extraordinary way. But, given our misunderstandings about celebration, we mostly make pseudo-celebration, that is, we overdo things to a point where we take our own awareness and our awareness of the occasion out of the equation.

We have a lot to overcome in our struggle to come to genuine celebration. We still need to learn that heightened enjoyment is not found in excess, deeper community is not found in mindless intimacy, and heightened awareness is not found in a frenzied deadening of our consciousness. Until we learn that lesson we will still mostly trudge home hung-over, more empty, more tired, and more alone than before the party. A hangover is a sure sign that, somewhere back down the road, we missed a sign post. We struggle to know how to celebrate, but we must continue to try.

Jesus came and declared a wedding feast, a celebration, at the centre of life. They crucified him not for being too ascetical, but because he told us we should actually enjoy our lives, assuring us that God and life will give us more goodness and enjoyment than we can stand, if we can learn to receive them with the proper reverence and without undue fear.
