

A cup of water... This image from today's gospel used in the above prayer reminds us that just the smallest actions done out of love for others make us disciples of Jesus - Apostles of Hope. That small gesture, that cup of water, that "bite-size" piece takes many forms.





A Reflection from Sister T~ "Speak Life"

Dear Parishioners,

Well good things are happening. YEAH! During this time, I noticed something very familiar. Do you remember back when you were a teenager (I had to go way back!) and you wanted your way? I remember saying, "But Nancy's mother said she could go." Or, "Why do we have to do it this way? Joey's mom does it like this." Ring a bell? And if you didn't say those words, you probably thought them! I know I did. Lately, I've been noticing a lot of adults who remind me of my teenage self. Sometimes I just don't get it, but no judgement here. Back in my teenage years, mothers knew best and they did what they did to show their care and love for us. Today, I think the Church and the state officials are also trying to do the same. So for me, I need to stop being a teenager and start listening and appreciating what is going on. And while I am doing this, I hope I can do it with some respect for myself and others.

With all of this in mind and on my heart, I wrote the following reflection for my community's "Wednesday Reflection" for June 17th. Enjoy and I hope it speaks life to you.

Wednesday Reflection – June 17: Speak Life

Surely, a good number of you out there love plants and planting in the garden. Somewhere I heard that it is great to talk to your plants as it helps them grow faster. In researching it, I learned one theory was that the vibrations of the voice helped and that a woman's voice had a larger range and so helped significantly more. *Words, sounds...* They not only have an effect on plants but also on people.

There is a song by Toby Mac, a Christian singer, entitled "Speak Life." Here are just a few of the words: "Speak life in the deepest darkest hours...Speak life...Sometimes the tongue gets twisted...Well it's crazy to imagine words from my lips as arms of compassion...Speak life."

I share these words at a time that is very challenging in our world. We are slowly coming out of our sheltering-in-place mode and re-entering the world we thought we knew. On top of that, we have seen some awful displays of violence. Don't you think that speaking words of kindness and life would help to heal all that is going on? That would mean that we all would have to start to think of the other as well as ourselves. All of us have been challenged in some way during the past few months. How do we find a new, and hopefully better, normal?

I would suggest that speaking words of life would work much better than angry, bitter words. Don't you think so? This is not an easy task and it will take a lot of practice, but the time to "speak life" is now! When you are having a tough day, isn't it uplifting to hear someone give a kind remark or smile or just be thoughtful? It can make a day seem so much brighter.

Are you willing and able to "speak life" to those you begin to interact with as you emerge from your shelter? Are you willing to retool your brain to speak words of encouragement and compliment, keeping the criticism to yourself? Are you willing to be sensitive to what others may be going through and "speak life" into their day?

My challenge for you this week is to listen to Toby Mac's song on YouTube (you can find the video at **an analysis of the set of the**

Live Streaming Mass~

Twelve weeks ago - due to Covid-19 and regulations mandated by our government and health agencies - to reduce the number of lives lost to Corona Virus... churches were required to stop holding public Mass and the distribution of Holy Communion.

This was an extremely sad day for everyone in our parish. We immediately turned to our cell phones and started live-streaming our daily and weekend Mass on March 22. Though very unsophisticated, we were happy to be able to not skip a week and bring Mass to you in the safety of your homes. We attempted to reach out to those with far more knowledge in streaming Mass than we had. This was at the height of personal distancing and businesses had their doors closed and were unable to inspect our church for what we needed - and even if we knew what was needed...we were not able to hire anyone to set-up the equipment. Amazon was no longer guaranteeing fast delivery and audio/visual equipment was now on backorder. We were using a five-foot ladder with a wooden crate atop as our tripod. We were using a plate/frame holder to steady the cell phone.

As you can understand there were many hurdles and we did the best we possibly could to continue livestreaming...yet we heard your frustration about the quality of the audio and the visual and we shared that frustration.

Fast forward - we did get a "real" tripod and invested in a lavalier system specifically for the I-Phone and we are learning how to work with the church sound system and the I-phone lavalier simultaneously. A lavalier is a headset/sound speaker - currently our priest are using two - one that is directly connected to the church system so Congregants can hear the Mass and another connected to the cell phone so those at home can hear the Mass without the echo or feedback from the vast area.

This has been a major learning adjustment for all of us involved. We would like to have the ability to continue live-streaming Mass for those who are still uncomfortable attending in person and in light of the fact that due to socially acceptable distancing we are only permitted 90 parishioners at any given Mass.

To do this properly we would like to look into a system whereby the camera is not a personal cell phone, but one permanently mounted and connected directly to our Facebook streaming and hopefully onto our website as well. Preferably hard-wired to avoid any interruptions in service as is known to happen dependent on Wi-Fi. This would eliminate the need for any one person to have to physically be in church to live-stream Masses 7 days a week.

Unfortunately, as the Business Manager, you can understand my hesitation to spend the \$5,000 to complete this project. With weekly collections not coming anywhere near needed funds to meet budget...spending \$5,000 is a major consideration.

We are not debating whether there is a need for live streaming to continue as that has already been determined.

I hate to come to our parishioners, especially during these financially difficult times, to ask for funding specifically for live-streaming equipment - yet, I find myself doing so and pray that you understand the need and if you are able to help financially, it would be greatly appreciated. Please mark Live streaming on your donation.

I would be happy to discuss anything with you personally and always appreciative of your generosity and support.



Below, please find the letter from Father Tom sent to all families on May 27th, 2020

Dear Parents of Children in Religious Education,

God's own peace be with you! I've been praying for you at our daily and Sunday Masses during these difficult days. I have also been praying for the success of what I invite you to commit to this coming school year as we re-imagine Religious Education for next year.

I begin by asking for ten minutes of your time. I ask you to use those ten minutes to watch a video with Father Casey Cole, OFM. Father Casey is a Franciscan priest and author who has his own blog and You Tube channel entitled "Breaking the Habit". The particular video I'm asking you to watch is called, "Saving a Dying, Shrinking Church". In it, Fr. Casey captures the mission of our Religious Education Program. The link for the video is https://www.woutbe.com/watch?v=8veA2XQDd_E. As Father Casey puts it: we want to "create mystics". To do so, we need you, the parents. He reminds us that for us and for our children, "Faith must be made personal."

The Religious Education Team has redesigned our parish program with an understanding of your new reality and ours, recognizing time demands and the many uncertainties we face as we approach the next school year. Following are the main points for our new Religious Education Program:

 Parents will be asked to view the Casey Cole video, "Saving a Dying Shrinking Church", YouTube video, April 15, 2020. We will be focusing our Religious Ed Program more on the importance of Family in catechesis.

2) All classes this year will be online. We will use Google Classroom and Google Meets. No classes will be held at Church/School.

3) All Classes will be prepared and taught by the Coordinators. When registering, Parents will not choose a day and time for class, or a Catechist. All students in a certain grade will be in the same class.

4) Students will have a week to complete a lesson. They will be required to answer a question/questions following each lesson. Attendance will be monitored through Google.

5) At the start of the year, all Parent Meetings, Class Masses and events will be virtual. Grade level events will be offered for students/families on campus as permitted, especially during Advent and Lent.

6) There will be a Family Parish Contribution instead of a Religious Ed Fee. Everything will be included in this contribution, there will be no additional fees for First Communion or Confirmation.

7) Registration will be online again this year.

8) Classes will begin in October.

We have worked hard to create something doable, engaging, realistic and exciting which we believe can "create mystics". I am asking you to commit to working with us and your children as we strive to be faithful disciples of Jesus and Apostles of Hope.

Our Deep Failure in Charity

Saint Eugene de Mazenod, the founder of the *Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate,* the Religious Congregation to which I belong, left us with these last words as he lay dying: *"Among yourselves, charity, charity, charity".* I don't always live that, though I wish I could, especially today.

We are in a bitter time. Everywhere there is anger, condemnation of others, and bitter disagreement; so much so that today we are simply unable to have a reasonable discussion on any sensitive political, moral, or doctrinal issue. We demonize each other to the point where any attempt to actually reason with each other (let alone to reach agreement or compromise) mostly just deepens the hostility. If you doubt this, simply watch the newscasts any evening, read any newspaper, or follow the discussion on most moral and religious questions.

The first thing that is evident is the naked hatred inside our energy and how we tend to justify it on moral and religious grounds. This is our protest: *we're fighting for truth, decency, justice, God, family, church, right dogma, right practice, for Christ himself, so our anger and hatred are justified.* Anger is justified, but hatred is an infallible sign that we are acting in a manner contrary to truth, decency, justice, God, family, church, right practice, and Christ. It would be hard to argue that this kind of energy issues forth from God's spirit and does not source itself elsewhere.

Looking at Jesus we see that all his energies were directed towards unity. Jesus never preached hatred, as is clear from the Sermon on the Mount, as is illustrated in his great priestly prayer for unity in John's Gospel, and as is evident in his frequent warnings to us to be patient with each other, to not judge each other and to forgive each other.

But one might object: what about Jesus' own (seemingly) bitter judgments? What about him speaking harshly of others? What about him losing his temper and using whips to drive the money-changers out of the temple? Indeed, what about his statement: *I have come to bring fire to this earth*?

These statements are perennially misinterpreted and used falsely to rationalize our lack of genuine Christian love. When Jesus says that he has come to bring fire to this earth and wishes it were already blazing, the fire he is referring to is not the fire of division but the fire of love. Jesus made a vow of love, not of alienation. His message provoked hateful opposition, but he did not self-define as a cultural or ecclesial warrior. He preached and incarnated only love, and that sometimes sparked its antithesis. (It still does.) He sometimes triggered hatred in people, but he never hated in return. Instead, he wept in empathy, understanding that sometimes the message of love and inclusivity triggers hatred inside of those who for whatever reason at that time cannot fully bear the word love. As well, the incident of him driving the money-changers out of the temple, forever falsely cited to justify our anger and judgment of others, has a very different emphasis and meaning. His action as he cleanses the temple of the people who were (legitimately) exchanging Jewish currency for foreign money in order let foreigners buy what they needed to offer sacrifice, has to do with him clearing away an obstacle in the way of universal access to God, not with anger at some particular people.

We frequently ignore the Gospel. Factionalism, tribalism, racism, economic self-interest, historical difference, historical privilege, and fear perennially cause bitter polarization and trigger a hatred that eats away at the very fabric of community; and that hatred perennially justifies itself by appealing to some high moral or religious ground. But the Gospel never allows for that. It never lets us bracket charity and it refuses us permission to justify our bitterness on moral and religious grounds. It calls us to a love, an empathy and a forgiveness that reach across every divide so as to wish good and do good precisely to those who hate us. And it categorically forbids rationalizing hatred in its name or in the name of truth, justice, or right dogma.

The late Michael J. Buckley, looking at the bitter polarization in our churches, suggests that nothing justifies our current bitterness: "The sad fact stands, however, that it is frequently no great trick to get religious men and women to turn on one another in some terrible form of condemnation. Wars, even personal wars, are terrible realities, and the most horrible of these are often self-righteously religious. For deceived or split off under the guise of good, under the rubrics of orthodoxy or liberality, of community or of personal freedom, even of holiness itself, factions of men and women can slowly disintegrate into pettiness or cynicism or hostility or bitterness. In this way the Christian church becomes divided."

We need to be careful inside our cultural and religious wars. There is never an excuse for lack of fundamental charity.

A Lighter Burden

This Week's Readings at Mass


- Zechariah 9:9-10 Restoration under the Messiah


For the past several weeks, Jesus gave instructions and warnings about how challenging it is to follow him. Yet today's reading gives the opposite impression: "come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest ... for my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Jesus' listeners were familiar with the image of a yoke because they were used to harnessing animals to do work in the field or to pull humans in carriages or cargo on wagons. In Judaism, the yoke was also a metaphor for the religious laws spelled out in the Old Testament.

Over time, religious leaders (mostly the Pharisees) added to the 613 official written laws, creating an oppressive burden for an ordinary Jewish citizen. Several times in Matthew's Gospel Jesus, lashed out at the Pharisees for making it almost impossible (especially for poor people, who were the majority of the population) to live by all the rules,

and for not lifting a finger to help them.





Whose burden can I relieve this week? Why is he or she so valuable?

In contrast, Jesus simplifies all of his religion's laws into two: love God and love your neighbor as yourself. For people struggling to keep track of hundreds of rules about how to wash your cups and utensils perfectly, what foods can and can't be on a plate together, what kinds of clothing fiber you could or couldn't wear, or what you could and couldn't do on the Sabbath, having only those two laws to follow was easy and light in comparison. Instead of having to worry about whether they were breaking any rules, Jesus' disciples could judge any decision with the measure of whether an action expressed love for God, self, and neighbor. That was the yoke Jesus was inviting them to carry-not the yoke of the Pharisees who cared more about the letter of the law than the spirit of the law.
