

SSPJ School Its an Awesome Place! Here's Why...

"Why are you sending her to Catholic School? We have good schools here". It's a question I hear pretty regularly from my family and friends, and I know they mean well when they ask, because they are right, the public schools are good, and as a single parent, they tell me, 'why would you put any additional stress on yourself, life is hard enough". The truth is, our actions and choices become our habits and our habits determine our character and our character determines who we will be, our destiny.

I chose to send my child to SSPJ because we want more than a school setting with good academics. At SSPJ the focus is not only on excellence in academics, but also on her development spiritually, morally, intellectually and ethically. Our children spend at least one third of each day at school, and a large portion of their waking hours, every week. For those of us who work full time, our children probably spend even more time at school, in before and after care, and as they get older, in extracurricular activities too.

Why SSPJ? Because of how I felt when I walked through the doors of my first open house at SSPJ. I met the teachers, the staff, the parents other families and experienced the love, strength, and preservation of values and beliefs that are vital in the development of character. When I first started attending mass at SSPJ, in 2013, my daughter, was about 2 years old. We tried several different parishes in our area, before we found SSPJ. Every week, one of the Priests or Deacons would reach out to my daughter, bless her, talk with her, make her smile, and I knew that this was the church that I wanted to call our parish, our home. There was no doubt in my mind, that when the time came, that I would do everything within my power to send my daughter to Catholic school.

Today my daughter is 7 years old and in the 1st grade at SSPJ, she started at SSPJ in September, 2015 in the Pre K program. Each year has been more amazing than the last. The staff are some of the most amazing people I have ever met, who continue to exceed our expectations. She has benefited so very much from the extraordinary environment at SSPJ School and Church. She has grown so much both, academically and spiritually. She enjoys attending mass each week with her class, and the school at their special celebrations throughout the year, the lessons they receive are priceless. She also loves when Father Tom and Father Patrick come to their classroom and spend time with the children, reading a story to them, and talking with them. Her reading, writing and language skills are progressing magnificently, as well as her affinity for math and her favorite subject - Science. She has been studying Mandarin, Spanish and Sign Language for 3 years. She proudly knows and recites her prayers, before meals, at bedtime, and when we are praying the rosary. She is learning that there is something greater than her, that she can always count on and rely on, no matter what is happening in her life.

She is also learning the importance of serving others, and the tremendous benefits it has on her own growth and that of her community. We love the after school clubs at SSPJ, she has been a member of the Sign Language Club and the Cheer Club for the past 3 years, and also enjoys other clubs, such as the Mad Science Fun Club and Story Hour. She looks forward to being able to get involved with other clubs, such as chorus, drama and dance and kick line. We have been blessed with so many wonderful friends at SSPJ, all of whom continually welcome my daughter and myself into their lives, their hearts and their continued prayers. We are so grateful for our Pastor, Father Tom and his continued support of our parish and our school. He is truly the hand of God, and always models Jesus in his teaching, he truly "walks the walk. Thank you to all of the Staff and Volunteers at SSPJ!



I am the mother of two children at SSPJ School. Madeline is in fourth grade and Tessa is in third grade. I, along with my sister and two brothers, are also SSPJ alumni. Most people who read that might think I was automatically biased toward SSPJ and a Catholic school education for my children as a result of this, but they would be mistaken. My husband and I sent our oldest daughter to public school in kindergarten. We live in a great school district and I had to admit, it made sense, especially from a financial standpoint. Early in my daughter's first year of school; however, I felt deep inside that something was missing. I couldn't put my finger on it and I still didn't immediately know that SSPJ School was the answer I was looking for until I attended their open house that January. There was an immediate sense of warmth, love and community, as if I had come home, and I wanted my children to be part of that community too. My daughters currently have several classmates whose parents also attended SSPJ with me and with my siblings, and there are several other children of alumni throughout the school. We are a loyal and loving community.

At SSPJ, not only do our children receive an unparalleled academic education, but they are also taught to live their Catholic faith every day and to walk with God. They're proud of their school and they're proud of their faith. They sing hymns at home. They tell us about discussions from their religion classes and what thoughts and ideas they contributed during class. We hear about random acts of kindness - so many of them every day. Is everything sunshine and rainbows all the time? Of course not. Our children experience the trials and tribulations that all school children face. Sometimes kids argue, sometimes they're mean to each other. But there is something else I've seen in my children and their peers at SSPJ when they're faced with such conflicts. They have such strong moral character and they show empathy, compassion and forgiveness for others because they are taught every day about the compassion and love of Jesus. When we choose where we want to send our kids to school, it should not just be about what we hope and expect for them to achieve academically, but also about the people we want our children to become. My husband and I are proud of our daughters every day for their achievements, but we are even more proud of who they are as people.

Music Ministry








The work of infinite patience

Reflections on Next Sunday's Scripture Readings

Acts 4:8-12 Psalm 118 1 John 3:1-2 John 10:11-18

Every day we hear of personal happiness and tragedy, of great feats and failures. Our tendency is to accept all of these without reflecting on their meaning, without understanding their significance. Today's readings are a study in understanding. They challenge us to not only tabulate the facts but to uncover the meaning of those facts. Believers are people who look to the deeper dimensions of life.

The scene in Acts has Peter addressing the highest Jewish authority, the Sanhedrin. The passage moves immediately beyond observation of physical facts to understanding. The cure of the sick man is a fact, the key issue is the meaning of that cure. Restoration of health is secondary to the salvation realized. The sick man enjoys good health because the Jesus who was rejected has been raised by God.


Psalm 118 is a psalm of thanksgiving for the king's miraculous escape from seemingly unbeatable enemies. The psalmist tells us that when the people see this radical turn of events they must understand it as God's doing.

The gospel atmosphere is charged with conflict. The author contrasts Jesus with Israel's leaders. Jesus, the ideal shepherd, does not hesitate to lay down his life for the sheep. It is the self-giving of Jesus that is at the heart of the Gentile mission.

The modern believer must react to the evil in society. Exploitation, oppression, and abuse of power are not accidents of nature. Believers must interpret that the power of Jesus' dying and rising has yet to penetrate these situations. Believers see this and take action.

By the same token, the believer reacts to the good in society. We affirm and applaud those who stand for truth, justice, and charity. Human gifts are held in high regard, especially when shared with all God's people.

REASONS TO BELIEVE IN GOD

Today belief in God is often seen as a naiveté. For many, believing in God is like believing in Santa and the Easter Bunny, nice, something for the kids, a warm nostalgia or a bitter memory, but not something that's real, that stands up to hard scrutiny and indeed stands up to the dark doubts that sometimes linger below the surface of our faith. Where's there evidence that God exists?

A true apologetics, I believe, needs at a point to be personal. So here are my own reasons why I continue to believe in God in the face of the agnosticism of our overly-adult world and despite the dark nights that sometimes beset me.

First, I believe in God because I sense, at the deepest level of my being, that there's an inalienable moral structure to things. Life, love, and meaning are morally-contoured. There's an inalienable "law of karma" that's experienced everywhere and in everything: good behavior is its own happiness, just as bad behavior is its own sorrow. Different religions word it differently but the concept is at the heart of all religion and is in essence the very definition of morality: *The measure you measure out will be the measure that's measured back to you*. That's Jesus' version of it, and can be translated this way: *The air you breathe out is the air you will re-inhale.* Simply put: If we cut down too many trees we will soon be breathing in carbon monoxide. If we breathe out love, we will meet love. If we breathe out hate and anger we will soon enough find ourselves surrounded by hated and anger. Reality is so structured that goodness brings goodness and sin brings sin.

I believe in God because blind chaos could not have designed things this way, to be innately moral. Only an intelligent Goodness could have built reality this way.

My next reason for believing in God is the existence of soul, intelligence, love, altruism, and art. These could not have emerged simply from blind chaos, from billions and billions of cosmic bingo chips coming out of nothing, with no intelligent loving force behind them, endlessly churning through billions of years. Random chaos, empty of all intelligence and love from its origins, could not have eventually produced soul and all that's highest inside it: intelligence, love, altruism, spirituality, and art. Can our own hearts and all that's noble and precious within them really be just the result of billions of fluke chances colliding within a brute, mindless process?

I believe in God because if our hearts are real than so is God.

Next, I believe in God because the Gospel works – if we work it. What Jesus incarnated and taught ultimately resonates with what's most precious, most noble, and most meaningful inside of life and inside each of us. Moreover, this checks out in life. Whenever I have the faith and courage to actually live out the Gospel, to roll the dice on its truth, it always proves to be true, the loaves multiply and feed the thousands and David defeats Goliath. But it doesn't work unless I risk it. The Gospel works, if we work it.

The objection could be raised here, of course, that many sincere, faith-filled people risk their lives and truth on the Gospel and, from all appearances in this world, it doesn't work for them. They end up poor, as victims, on the losing side of things. But again, that's a judgment we make from the standards of this world, from the Gospel of Prosperity where whoever has the most worldly success wins. The Gospel of Jesus undercuts this. Anyone who lives it out as faithfully as he or she is able, will be blessed with something beyond worldly success, namely, the deeper joy of a life well-lived, a joy which Jesus assures us is deeper, less ephemeral, and more lasting that any other joy.

I believe in God because the Gospel works! As does prayer!

Finally, though certainly not least, I believe in God because of the community of faith that stretches back to the beginning of time, that stretches back to the life and resurrection of Jesus, and that baptized me into the faith. Throughout all of history virtually all human communities have been also communities of faith, of belief in God, of worship, and of sacred ritual and sacrament.

I believe in God because of the existence of families of faith and the existence of church and sacrament.

I wrote my doctoral thesis on the classical proofs for the existence of God, arguments for God's existence taken from some of the great intellectuals in history: Anselm, Thomas Aquinas, Descartes, Leibnitz, Spinoza, and Alfred North Whitehead. I rambled through nearly 500 hundred pages of articulating and evaluating these proofs and then ended with this conclusion.

We don't come to believe in God because of the compelling power of some mathematical equation or logical syllogism. God's existence becomes real to us when we live an honest, sincere life.
