Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Here we are again in "ordinary time". We have packed away the Christmas decorations for another year. But hopefully we haven't packed away the spirit and promise and reality of Christmas. We celebrated the coming of Emmanuel - of God with us. Now we strive to live the Christmas miracle throughout the year, for Jesus remains with us - encouraging us, guiding us, and inviting us to keep the light of Christmas burning in our hearts and in our actions.

An interesting question is raised in today's gospel as we begin ordinary time: "what are you looking for?" Many of us are looking to grow in our faith, to deepen our relationship with Jesus. Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP, notes:

The Gospel tells us about seekers who discovering a deeper call. The people in today's story already are people looking for God. John the Baptist is a mentor to his disciples and he points them to another who will be their teacher ("Rabbi"). John uses a favorite image for Jesus, "Lamb of God." It is rich in many biblical meanings, and the commentators warn us not to settle on just one.

But we too have had our titles, our names for Jesus. How do we know these titles are still valid for us? Haven't we changed, haven't our lives grown? Who is Jesus for us now and how do we call upon him? We, like the disciples of John, are being invited to follow Jesus at this time in our lives, to spend time with him and to discover who he is for us now. Like the two disciples we are seekers who want to "stay" with Jesus.

As today's seekers, still looking to stay with Jesus, how do we proceed? Perhaps we might take a clue from today's first reading, for as Eli instructed Samuel, we too make time to say, *Speak, Lord, your servant is listening*. This does mean that we will actually allow God to speak to our hearts - that we will make some time to be still and listen. It's a challenge in today's hectic world. Are you and I up for the challenge? As Apostles of Hope, we support one another in service, in prayer, and *in listening*.

One of our parishioners who has been directing and acting in a local theatre company, Doctor Chuck Calabrese, has graciously offered to put on the play *To Kill a Mockingbird* for us on January 28th. Chuck is very much into the ministry of Mathew Kelly of Dynamic Catholic. All proceeds from the play will be used purchase copies one of Matthew's books. Our hope is to offer these books free of charge to all who join us on Easter Sunday. Look for more information in the bulletin. Hope to see you there!

Looking ahead, Catholic Schools week arrives at the end of this month. I encourage all with school age children and without to come and rejoice in the treasure we have in SSPJ School. We continue to outscore scholastically **ALL area schools**, have strong spiritual, academic, social and athletic offerings and enjoy a recognized history of overall excellence in the Diocese of Rockville Centre. As I leave on vacation I ask you to welcome back not only my friend but yours -- the joy-filled Franciscan friar, Father Kevin Cronin, OFM, who is looking forward to filling in for me. I hope to bring back some warm sunshine!







This priest says Adoration has made Juarez a safer city By Bárbara Bustamante

Juarez, Mexico, Nov 22, 2017 / 03:09 am (<u>CNA/EWTN News</u>).- Juarez, located in the state of Chihuahua in northern Mexico, was considered from 2008 to 2010 to be one of the most dangerous cities in the world, due to drug trafficking violence. However, the city of 1.3 million inhabitants dropped off this list thanks to a significant decrease in the number of homicides. Although this drop can be credited to an improvement in the work of local authorities, for Fr. Patrico Hileman – a priest responsible for establishing Perpetual Adoration chapels in Latin America – there is a much deeper reason: *Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament*.

"When a parish adores God day and night, the city is transformed," Fr. Hileman said.

The missionaries only took three days to establish the first Perpetual Adoration chapel in Juarez. Fr. Hileman told how one day, when the city was under a state of siege, a lady was on her way to the chapel to do her Holy Hour at 3:00 in the morning, when she was intercepted by six soldiers who asked her where she was heading. When the woman told them that she was going to "the little chapel" at that moment the lady said to the soldiers: "Do you think you're protecting us? We're praying for you 24 hours a day." Two months after the chapel was opened, there has not been one death in Juarez.

One of the uniformed men fell down holding his weapon, "crying in front of the Blessed Sacrament. The next day at 3:00 in the morning they saw him in civilian clothes doing a Holy Hour, crying oceans of tears," he said.

If you are generous with Jesus, he is a thousand times more generous with you," Fr. Hileman said.

Expose your heart, surrender your burden, be free in the arms of Jesus....

Reflections on Next Sunday's Celebration

Jonah 3:1-5,10 Psalm 25 1 Corinthians 7:29-31 Mark 1:14-20

Today's passages deal with both reception and communication of God's Word. Believers are partners with God in the joint venture of spreading the message. Believers are leaven to the world. The Word will have great impact.

In the fifth century B.C., the author of Jonah addressed an audience who demanded that God act according to human standards. To make his point, the author writes of a reluctant prophet who prefers to go west when commanded to go northeast. Jonah finally gives in and the entire populace is converted.

Convinced that the Second Coming of Jesus was imminent, Paul exhorted his Corinthian Christians not to get involved in a change of marital status. The married were becoming single, the single were marrying. Paul was wrong about the Second Coming timetable, but he is still a good example of a believer seeking to elaborate the meaning of the Word to others.

Mark's Jesus is in touch with God's plan. The expression "reign of God" connotes the royal program to provide for the needs of the people, especially the poor. Jesus calls for a radical change in thinking and acting and a trusting acceptance of the Good News. Mark then describes the call of the first four disciples and their total dedication to the Master. Their call is not a private enterprise. To hear the Word is to share the Word.

The barometer of our Christian values is our manner toward one another. If our first thought after Sunday Mass is being first out of the parking lot, then the Word has not had much impact on us. The gospel opens us to community.

HOW CAN IT ALL HAVE A HAPPY ENDING?

There's a line in the writings of Julian of Norwich, the famous 14th century mystic and perhaps the first theologian to write in English, which is endlessly quoted by preachers, poets, and writers: But all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well. It's her signature teaching.

We all have an intuitive grasp of what that means. It's our basis for hope. In the end, the good will triumph. But the phrase takes on added meaning when it's seen in its original context. What was Julian trying to say when she coined that phrase?

She was struggling with the problem of evil, sin, and suffering: Why does God allow them? If God is both all-loving and allpowerful what possible explanation can there be for the fact that God lets us suffer, lets us sin, and lets evil be present all over the world? Why didn't God create a world without sin, where we would all be perfectly happy from birth onwards?

Julian had heard enough sermons in church to know the standard apologetic answer for that, namely, that God allows it because God gave us the great gift of freedom. With that comes the inevitability of sin and all its sad consequences. That's a valid answer, though one that's often seen as too abstract to offer much consolation to us when we are suffering. But Julian, despite being a loyal daughter of the church and having been schooled in that answer, doesn't go there. She offers something different.

For her, God allows evil, sin, and suffering because God will use them in the end to create for everyone a deeper mode of happiness than they would have experienced if sin, evil, and suffering hadn't been there. In the end, these negatives will work towards creating some deeper positives.

Let me quote Julian in the original (the Middle English within which she wrote): Jesus, in this vision informed me of all that I needed answered by this word and said: 'Sinne is behovely, but alle shalle be wele, and alle shalle be wele, and all manner of thing shalle be wele.'

She shares that Jesus says that sin is "behovely". In Middle English, behovely has these connotations: "useful", "advantageous", "necessary". In her vision, sin, evil, and suffering are ultimately advantageous and even necessary in bringing us to deeper meaning and greater happiness. (Not unlike what we sing in our great Easter hymn: O happy fault, O necessary sin of Adam.)

What Julian wants us to draw out from this is not the idea that sin and evil are of little consequence but rather that God, being so unimaginable in love and power, is able to draw good out of evil, happiness out of suffering, and redemption out of sin in ways that we cannot yet grasp. This is Julian's answer to the question: Why does God allow evil? She answers by not answering because, in essence, no adequate answer can ever be imagined. Rather, she sets the question into a theology of God within which, beyond what we can imagine at present and beyond what theology can really account for, God's power and love will eventually make all things well, dry every tear, redeem every evil, erase every bad memory, unfreeze every cold heart, and turn every manner of suffering into happiness. There's even a hint in this that the final triumph of God will be to empty hell itself so that, indeed, absolutely every manner of being will be well.

In a subsequent vision, Julian received a five-fold assurance from God that God may, can, will, and shall make all things well and we ourselves will see it.

All of this is predicated of course on a particular concept of God. The God that Julian of Norwich invites us to believe in is a God who is precisely beyond our imagination both in power and in love. Any God we can imagine is incapable of making all manner of being well (as many atheistic critics have already pointed out). This not just true in terms of trying to imagine God's power, it's particularly true in terms of trying to imagine God's love. It's unimaginable in our present human condition to picture anyone, God or human, who cannot be offended, is incapable of anger, holds nothing against anyone no matter what evil he or she may have perpetrated, and who (as Julian describes God) is completely relaxed and has a face like a marvelous symphony. The God of our imagination, re-enforced by certain false interpretations of scripture, does get offended, does get angry, does take vengeance, and does meet sin with wrath. Such a God is incapable of making all manner of things well. But such a God is also not the God whom Jesus revealed.

Were we to look into the eyes of God's, says Julian, what we would see there would "melt our hearts with love and break them in two with ecstasy."

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
