A Letter from Rev. Dennis Gannon


On June 8th, I had my one year anniversary as a priest. With the Feast Day of St. John Vianney, the patron saint of parish priests, just having past on August 4th, I reflect on this year gone by. The two things that come to mind right away are how quickly the year went by, and just how much I love being a priest.

Something I have been asked recently is "Can you believe you have been a priest for more than a year already?", to which my answer as honestly been, "No, I cannot". I know that people always say time flies when you are having fun, but I really do feel like I blinked, and it was already July 2025. I suppose between my parish ministry, my working with the school, and helping occasionally at Stony Brook University, I always had plenty to do, but it never felt burdensome or difficult. Looking back through the year, there were so many moments of joy and learning, and while the year went quickly, it was a year I loved.

I don't think, even in my expectations in seminary, I could have understood just how much I love the priesthood before being a priest. Being able to say the sacraments is a gift beyond words. Confecting the Eucharist in Mass, saying the prayer of Absolution in Confession, anointing someone in Last Rites, it is an incredibly humbling and beautiful thing. Even the simply being called "Father", something I waited 9 years for, is a privilege I treasure. When I am called to a home or hospital to anoint someone, I am not being called because I am Dennis Gannon. I am being called because I am a priest, a priest of Jesus Christ. And that is something I am grateful for each and every day.

The priesthood is the greatest gift God has ever given me. The same gift He gave to Fr. Sean, Fr. Martin, St. John Vianney, and the countless priests throughout the history of the Church. It is a gift that I treasure, and a gift I am so happy to be able to live here at SSPJ. In the spirit of St. John Vianney's feast, I ask for your prayers for myself and for all priests, as well as for any man who is called to the priesthood. May He continue to bless His priests, and may He continue to bless us here at SSPJ.

OCIA PROGRAM STARTS IN SEPTEMBER

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (formerly RCIA) is the process by which adults are gradually introduced to the Catholic faith and sacramental life.

This process is intended for:

- Unbaptized adults who seek to receive the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and the Holy Eucharist.
- Baptized non-Catholic Christians, who desire to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church.
- Baptized Catholics, who have not yet completed their sacraments of initiation (Confirmation and/or First Holy Communion).

Here at Saints Philip and James, the OCIA process begins in September and culminates at the Easter Vigil on April 4, 2026. If you know anyone —be it a neighbor, a friend, or a family member —who may be interested in this process, please share the program with them and ask them to **call the Parish Center at 631-584-5454** for more information. You may be doing them the greatest favor they have ever received.



On March 25, 2020, the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord, the Church celebrated the 25th anniversary of the papal encyclical *Evangelium vitae* (*The Gospel of Life*). This prophetic document, written by a great saint of our time, Pope John Paul II, reaffirmed the Church's constant teaching on the value and inviolability of every human life.

In this encyclical, the Holy Father explains that the Gospel of Life is at the *heart* of Jesus' saving message to the world. Through the Incarnation of Christ, God reveals to us the dignity of all human life. Each of us is made in the image and likeness of God, reflecting his glory and his imprint. We are therefore called to "respect, defend and promote the dignity of every human person, at every moment and in every condition of that person's life."

Evangelium vitae highlights the special and particular role of women in bearing the gift of life to the world. Pope John Paul II offers heartfelt thanks to these "heroic mothers," who, placing their trust in God, "devote themselves to their own family without reserve, who suffer in giving birth to their children and who are ready to make any effort, to face any sacrifice, in order to pass on to them the best of themselves."²

Pope John Paul II also outlines the many challenges that expectant mothers may face, including lack of support from the father, financial strains, concerns about her own health or that of her child, and pressures from family and friends. The Holy Father recognizes that an "unborn child is totally entrusted to the protection and care of the woman carrying him or her in the womb." For this reason,

it is particularly important that the Church come alongside mothers, offering them encouragement, assistance, and support.

Through Christ, we have received the gift of the Gospel of Life in its fullness. As members of the Church, we are the *people of life and for life*. It is our duty to proclaim the truth of the Gospel of Life to the world, for "to proclaim Jesus is itself to proclaim life." Pope John Paul II tasked us with building a culture of life to combat the forces at work in the culture of death. He challenged us:

With great openness and courage, we need to question how widespread is the culture of life today among individual Christians, families, groups and communities in our Dioceses. With equal clarity and determination we must identify the steps we are called to take in order to serve life in all its truth.⁵

In honor of *Evangelium vitae*'s 25th anniversary and in answer to Pope John Paul II's call, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Committee on Pro-Life Activities launched a nationwide effort entitled, *Walking with Moms in Need*. Parishes, through the support of their bishops and pastors, are invited to join this effort to increase the Church's outreach and support to pregnant women facing difficult or unexpected pregnancies. This special anniversary has provided the Church with an opportunity to assess, expand, and better communicate resources to pregnant moms and families in need.

Pregnant and parenting moms in need are in our parishes and our neighborhoods, but in desperation, they are turning to other places for help. We know the needs and challenges can be immense for women in difficult pregnancies, especially women in poverty, and the sources for help may not be apparent to those most needing support. Women facing challenging pregnancies should see the Church as a place where they can find help, especially with its extensive social services dedicated to meeting the needs of people in crisis.

Through *Walking with Moms in Need* the Church is being asked to respond to Pope John Paul II's call and honestly assess the pastoral and practical assistance that it currently provides to pregnant moms and families in need and how effective it is in communicating such help.

Pope John Paul II wrote that,

"gratitude and joy at the incomparable dignity of man impel us to share [the Gospel of Life] with everyone."

He said we need to bring this message "to the hearts of all people and make it penetrate every part of society." By reaching out to lovingly support and care for pregnant women and their children, we witness to the sanctity of every human person, in every stage and every circumstance.

Evangelium vitae emphasizes that, "where

life is involved, the service of charity must be profoundly consistent. It cannot tolerate bias and discrimination, for human life is sacred and inviolable... We need then to 'show care' for all life and for the life of everyone." Pope John Paul II highlights the incredible history of service and charity that the Church has provided throughout the centuries to those abandoned and forgotten by society. He urges that "every Christian community, with a renewed sense of responsibility, must continue to write this history."

We are called to reverence and love every human person as ourselves. It is our responsibility to care for and protect human life, especially the lives of the most vulnerable among us. *Evangelium vitae* teaches us that "the task of accepting and serving life involves everyone; and this task must be fulfilled above all towards life when it is at its weakest."¹⁰

Pope John Paul II wrote, "the Gospel of God's love for man, the Gospel of the dignity of the person and the Gospel of life are a single and indivisible Gospel." The Gospel of Jesus is the Gospel of Life, and to love Jesus is to love and serve life. As followers of Christ, may we strive to continually respond to the needs of the poor and vulnerable entrusted to us by God.

As part of Walking with Moms in Need, the USCCB Secretariat of Pro-Life Activities is providing educational, pastoral, and action-oriented resources to help parishes go to the peripheries and bring hope and help to mothers in need. Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year C August 17, 2025

Gospel - Luke 12: 49-53

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus said to his disciples:

"I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing!
There is a baptism with which I must be baptized, and how great is my anguish until it is accomplished!
Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth?
No, I tell you, but rather division.
From now on a household of five will be divided, three against two and two against three; a father will be divided against his son and a son against his father, a mother against her daughter and a daughter against her mother, a mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law."

Gospel Reflection Process

- Pray a simple prayer to the Holy Spirit: "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening."
- Read the passage slowly. As you listen, ask in silence, "Lord, what are you saying to me in this passage?"
- Listen for a word or phrase that calls your attention or touches your heart.
- Share a brief story or experience of how the word or phrase connects to your life at this moment.
- Ask in silence, "Lord, what do you want me to do?" Share what Jesus is inviting you to do.
